RED OAK RIDGE TRAIL BACKPACK

This is an easy Class I hike down to the shore of Dale Hollow Lake. The trail is an old jeep trail and easy to walk with very little change in elevation. Dale Hollow Lake is a beautiful man-made lake and the trail overlooks the lake at one particular scenic point. We will camp on one of two scenic peninsulas and we will have plenty of time to explore the area after making camp.

This trip is for beginning backpackers and it is approximately 4.6 miles roundtrip.

The weather should be warm during the day and slightly cool at night.

AMMENDMENT TO BY-LAW TO ESTABLISH FAM-ILY MEMBERSHIP - At the April Board Meeting, the TTA Board of Directors proposed the following ammendment to By-law No. 5: Add the following after the 1st sentence: "Dues for additional members in the same family shall be three dollars (\$3.00) per year. Family members shall enjoy full membership privileges.



TRIP REPORT-Regardless of heavy storms the night and early morning before, the Buffalo Arch to Coffee Overlook hike proved to be a great success and a most enjoyable experience for all who participated. By the time everyone met at Pickett State Park office, 10:00 a.m., March 21, the weather had cleared. The party entered the woods in the southern portion of the Daniel Boone National Forrest, and hiked to an unnamed, but scenic cliff, where everyone had lunch near a small waterfall. Upon finishing lunch, the group then made their way to Buffalo Arch, which is a natural sandstone arch rock formation. The hikers found numerous flint chips and bone fragments to testify to the fact that this location was inhabitated by fairly large Indian hunting parties in times long lost to memory. From Buffalo Arch the group hiked into the Rock Creek gorge where they happened upon some natives of these woods, a red tailed hawk, which seemed annoyed at the intrusion and a three foot long garter snake that slithered unconcerned across the trail. Many wild flowers were seen along the way. The hikers found both yellow and blue Violets, Trailing Arbutis, Hepatica and some that were unidentified. After leaving Rock Creek the group hiked back up a steep grade to Coffee Ridge where thay were greeted by the panaronic view that one must be there to truly appreciate. The group then made thier way two miles along an access road to highway 154 where they were picked up by the ones who furnished vehicles. The hikers also did some work along the way. George Minnigh furnished trash bags and as the party made their way, they picked up all visible litter along the trail left behind by other less than tidy visitors. If awards were given for "Trail Cleaner of the Day", Ruth Slusher of Oak Ridge would have it by seeing and picking up the garbage that others would have missed.
