FALL HIKE DAY, LAND BETWEEN THE LAKES

Saturday, October 1, 1983

The TTA and TVA's Land Between the Lakes (LBL) will co-sponsor a Hike Day at the Fort Henry Hiking Trails in the southern portion of LBL. The Fort Henry Trails offer hikes ranging from 2.4 miles to 15.5 miles. Hike Day registration will be at the Fort Henry Trail parking lot from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. No preregistration is required. Groups should check in on arrival. Day hikers are asked to be off the trail by 5 p.m. Adequate parking is available. Groups may camp at Piney Campground or Boswell Landing Lake access. A fee of \$6 per night, plus 50 cents for electricity will be charged at Piney. There is no charge at Boswell Landing. Groups are asked to furnish their own guides or qualified leaders. Emergency aid will be available. Take US Hwy 79 between Dover, TN and Paris Landing, TN. About 1 mile west of Dover, turn right (north) on Rt. 49 (The Trace) and follow to South Information Station; turn left, continue on this road until you come to Boswell Landing, Ft. Henry Trail Sign and turn right. Follow straight ahead for one mile to Ft. Henry Trails (Boswell Landing is to right as you come into gravel road).

ATTENTION TTA MEMBERS!!!!

Come, enjoy good food, fellowship, and hike the rugged trails of the Cumberland Plateau with the Cumberland Mountain Chapter, at the TTA annual meeting on October 14, 15, and 16. Visit the well known Twin Arches, Parch Corn Lodge, and descend into the pristine forest along Laurel Creek. You will be glad you came, and regret it if you don't!

UPDATE ON CUMBERLAND TRAIL - I wanted to bring you and the general member-ship of TTA up on the current situation and progress of the Cumberland Trail sections we are working on. Section 1: Cumberland Gap to Cove Lake. Approximately 28 of the 42 miles in this section have been completed. Unfortunately, the growing season so far this year has been so intense, the trail is grown over about a month after completion. This section is undoubtedly some of the nicest I have ever seen. Between Woodson's Gap and McClains Rock (about $4-4\frac{1}{2}$ miles), there is a natural bridge on the crest, a 100 ft. waterfall just below the crest, Alum Cave Rockhouse, which is so big it's listed in the Caves of Tennessee publication. This rockhouse also has over a 100 foot waterfall falling over the face of it. Section III: Oliver Springs to Nemo: On July 15, we finally got our 6 man prison labor crew started up. They are under the supervision of Chuck Chandler. Chuck has been working on the CT for about 12 years. He was a YACC crewchief on the CT before that. Anyway, barring any more landowner problems, we hope to get to Nemo sometime this winter Mike Dahl

TTA Hike - 10/11 September 1983 Lower Loop Cane Creek Trail Fall Creek Falls State Park

This will be a two day overnighter on the 12 mile loop trail that tranverses the northern portion of this 16,000 acre park located on the Cumberland Plateau. The trail is rated Class II-III and crosses the Cane Creek Gorge. There will be 6 miles of hiking each day with Saturday(gorge section) being slightly more difficult than Sunday. Hikers should bring neccessary equipment and expect to carry some water on the hike. Meet at the Park Nature Center at 10:00 A.M. (CDT). Note: since the wells may be dry, plan on carrying several quarts of water.

CAMPBELL CAVE SUBTERRANEAN HIKE (FENTRESS COUNTY)
Sunday, September 11, 1983

On September 11 the Cumberland Mountain Chapter will be hiking underneath Campbell Mountain. Campbell Cave is found on an old farm in the Poplar Cove section of Fentress Co. at the foot of Campbell Mountain. This cave has seen much use over the past 150 years. Saltpeter was mined here during the Civil War with some evidence of this mining operation left. Campbell Cave is a small cave with many interesting features. While this is a relatively safe cave, there will be some dangerous areas. This activity is not recommended for the weak at heart or those badly out of shape. There will be some crawling along low, narrow passageways, so if you fear close spaces you may not want to participate in this activity. Expect to get dirty! Be sure you wear strong, old clothes. Long pants and long sleeves are a must. If you have a hard hat you might want to bring it. Hard hats are not required, but it saves on bumped heads. Strong boots with good soles are necessary. Everyone must bring a good flashlight.



The custodian told us about some of the history of the bldg. and that it is listed in the Nat'l Register of Historic Places. He also told us about some of the famous and not so famous who are buried at Elmwood. The first burial was in 1857 and since then many prominent in Memphis History have been buried there, including mayors, politicians, yellow fever victims, Civil War Generals, and veterans from other wars. Ethnic groups include Chinese, German and Greek. There are eighty acres of well-kept grounds with many ancient oaks, hugh magnolias, hollies, and crepe myrtle which give the visitor a feeling of beauty and tranquility.
