BCB BROWN RECEIVES TENNESSEE THAILS AWARD bob Brown, a mashville banking official, qualifies for the title, "Er. Tennessee Trails", perhaps more than anyone else. When he and Mack Prichard and Evan Means got together in the fall of 1968 to talk about organizing a group to establish a Tennessee State Trails System, he was treasurer of the Tennessee Scenic Livers Association. Since he became the first president of the new Tennessee Trails Association on Dec. 7, 1968, he hasn't found much time for rivers. Bob stepped down from president to vice-president after the first year so he would have more time to work on the Cumberland Trail. He built several miles of the trail in Cumberland County singlehanded. In the early days, when there was a work party somewhere on the trail, Bob was there. He worked on the section from Baptist Gap to Tristate
Peak with John McIntyre, Donald Todd, Evan Leans and others, in a chilling drizzle one day and excessive heat on another. Bob and his mother seldom missed a membership hike, including the first exploratory hike on the Trail of the Lonesome Pine. When he dropped out of trail work to continue his education, he drove from Nash-ville to Boone, NC, to talk about TTA's program at the Appalachian Trail Conference biennial meeting, then rushed back to his preparation for a final exam. Bob had a hand in the first draft of the Tennessee State Trails Act and helped organize the first state trails seminar, at which it was presented. The act was withheld for improvements and was intorduced and passed the next year. When TTA decided to incorporate, Bob found the legal counsel we needed. When help was needed to meet the publisher's deadline for the book "Tennessee Trails", Bob was the first to vol-unteer. He set up and administers the fund provided by life membership dues and the royalties from the book. Bob likes to hunt and fish, as well as tackpack on a mountain trail. When he isn't doing one or the other of those things, he takes a bicycle tour. Now that work is being stepped up on the Cumberland Trail, Ect is back on that project. This award is long overdue.

ANNUAL MEETING A SUCCESS - Approximately 50-75 people enjoyed the great weather, good food, fun and fellowship at our annual meeting, Oct. 14-16, at Pickett State Park. Friday night, the early arrivals feasted with a potluck supper, and enjoyed live bluegrass music. That evening, short slide presentations and talks were given by Vic Canada and John Clark (Maine), David Stidham (Large-diameter waterwheels), and warren Dixon (Grand Canyon).

Saturday's program was kicked off with an enjoyable and informative program on the cultural heritage of the Cumberland Flateau people, by Bobby Fulcher, TN Dept. of Conservation. We learned the TTA membership includes members of the Hicks family of Fentress Co., probably the most important family in the U.S. in regards to their contribution to traditional music. During the business meeting, Terry Bonham, state trails administrator, updated us on the Cumbeland Trail and other state trail projects. Following the meeting, we all went to the woods and enjoyed hiking in the Fickett State Forest and vicinity. Saturday evening, the recipient of the 1983 Tennessee Trails Award was announced (see accompanying article), followed by an informative presentation on the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area by Fark Service Interpretor, Bob Daum. With our appetites whetted by Bob's slides, we sought satisfaction Sunday with several hikes on the new trails in the Big South Fork area. Thanks to the Cumberland Mountain Chapter for the tremendous efforts put forth in making the annual meeting a great success! Hope to see you all at the 1984 meeting, to be hosted by the Murfreesboro Chapter.

The Tennessee Environmental Council held their intergroup conference the first of this month and the main topic was water issues. An excellent address was given by Commissioner James Word of the Department of Health and Environment, followed by Ass't Com. Mike Bruner with a slide presentation on waters of Tennessee, showing pollution and clear streams. Excellent workshops were held

throughout the day on Saturday. 1. Clean Water Act & State Legislative changes with leader Margaret Hamilton of the Audubon Society.

2. Protecting Wetlands with Leader Tony Campbell of Tennessee Conservation League, and Gerald Montgomery of the Wildlife Society.

3. Free Rivers with Leader Bertha Chrietzberg of TN Scenic Rivers Assoc., and Tennessee Trails Assoc.

4. Acid Rain: Chicken Little Was Right with Leader Randy Brown of the TN Council of Trout Unlimited

5. Ground Water Protection: Dumps, Surface Impoundments, and Federal Facilities with Leader Gary Davis of the Legal Environmental Assistance 6. Surface Mining with Leader Susan Williams of Save Our Cumberland Mountains.

Out of each of these six workshops came recommendations which went back to the TEC Board to be approved and distributed to officials or organizations that might best act on them. The weekend was very informative. The Tennessee Environmental Council is an umbrella organization to which about 40 environmentally oriented groups belong including TTA.

CUMBERLAND TRAIL, SECTION I, (CAMBELL COUNTY)
SATURDAY, NOVERMBER 12, 1983

The Cumberland Trail staff will be leading a hike on the Northern section of the CT on November 12th. This 4½ mile section of the trail has, without a doubt, some of the most spectacular features of any section of trail I've ever seen. The hike will start at Woodson's Gap, about 8 miles north of LaFollette, and head north towards McClains Rock. About 1/2 mile out there are two rock outcroppings that offer a splendid view of the Grat Vally and Smokey's. Just below, is a massive rock house with a waterfall that plunges over the face of the rockhouse some 100 feet. A mile out is "hole-in-the-Mountain", a natural bridge that is on the very crest of the mountain. To my knowledge, this is the only natural bridge in east Tennessee (the top of the mountain is the Tennessee Divide). The best, however, will be last. Alum Cave Rockhouse is located just below McClain's Rock (elevation 2923 feet). The rockhouse measures some 400 feet wide and over a 100 feet tall. There is a waterfall that breaks over the face of the rockhouse into a crystal clear plungepool. This rock house is reported to have over 22 different colors of sand(stone) in its walls. The colors range from black, grreen, orange, red and yellow to white. One corner of the rockhouse has a sand cave 5 feet high by 20-30 feet wide and over 100 feet deep. This place is guaranteed to give your eyeballs an orgasm. Meet at Cove Lake State Park, Cumberland Trail Office, at 9:00am EST. We will provide the shuttle service back to the park. You will need sturdy footwear, water and lunch and appropriate dress (Novembers being the way the are). The trail is generally Class II. Some of the side trip excursions will be a little rougher. will also SPECIAL: If enough people are interested, we spend the night camping in Alum Cave Rockhouse. 
ACCORDIAN BLUFF TRAIL, DALE HOLLOW
