DIFFICULTY RATINGS:

- (Easy) Level, well worn, well marked Class I for easy walking or strolling, no special footgear.

Class II - (Moderate) Some steep ground, good walking, well marked, proper footgear recommended.

- (Difficult) Steeper ground and rocks, Class III some use of hands for balance, proper footgear.

- (Very Difficult) Rugged terrain, steep Class IV ground and rocks, use of hands for balance and proper footgear required.

- (Maximum Difficulty) Very rugged Class V terrain, steep ground and rocks, not for beginning hikers.

FALL CREEK FALLS BACKPACK Sept. 10-11, 1983

Despite the heat and dryness of this summer, five hikers; Harry Williamson, Bob Richards, Godlind and Erin Johnson, and Erin's friend Ruthie made the trip. A cold front had passed through while we travelled from the top of Plateau down into the Cane Creek Gorge. As we stopped to take a break at the new suspension bridge, a brief shower found us using the hand cables and a poncho for a temporary shelter. The creek was completely dry although there were cardinal flowers, phlox and other wildflowers blooming. The hike out of the gorge was slow and steady with a break taken near the top by a small rockhouse that had been carved out by a 20' waterfall. We camped for the night on the western side of the Gorge. Sunday hike was easier being all on top of the Plateau and we paused for views of Piney Creek and Falls, Fall Creek Falls and Gorge and Cane Creek Cascades and Falls. After finishing the hike we celebrated by eating lunch at the Park Inn.

Village Creek State Park, September 24 (Memphis Chapter) - Sprawling across 7,000 acres of woodland on Crowley's Ridge in eastern Arkansas is Village Creek State Park. Park Naturalist Larry Lohman led 22 hikers on an 8 mile loop exploring the unique natural beauty of this area. Many plants and trees found growing on Crowley's Ridge are uncommon anywhere else west of the Mississippi River. Larry also pointed out Jewelweed and Coldenseal and told us of their medicinal uses. He showed us the endanged tree Butternut or White Walnut. We had an interesting lesson on how he makes maple syrup from the Sugar Maple trees which grow in the Park. As we walked through a section where the trees were all tilted, Larry explained that this was caused by the ground moving 50 feet east due to pressure from a new manmade lake nearby. It was a gorgeous day; and Larry was a super interesting hike leader and gladly shared his wealth of knowledge with us. We are eagerly looking forward to another hike with him in the A. L. & B. P. spring.

Mt. Leconte Lodge Trip September 28-29, 1983

Nine hikers met at the Sugarlands Visitor Center eagerly looking forward to two days of hiking in the Smokies. After arranging a car shuttle at Newfound Gap and Alum Cave Parking Area we started up the Alum Cave Bluffs Trail. The trail followed Alum Cave Creek and then turned north to follow Styx Branch. A rest stop was taken at Arch Rock, and then climbed up through Arch Rock and left Styx Branch climbing upward to the Bluffs. Just before Alum Cave, we ate lunch at an overlook with a view of the Bluffs, the Chimney Tops and Anakeesta Ridge. We then continued the climb up to the Lodge with the trail crossing several landslide areas with good views of the mountains. The Lodge was reached by 3:00P.M. and the 5.5 miles(elev. gain of 2,800') had been covered in just 4 hours. After inspecting the Cabin we were assigned and claiming beds, we took a side trail to Cliff Top and took a welcomed break laying on the rocks soaking up the sun. The weather was perfect, blue skies with white puufy clouds, sunny and bright and great views of everything from

our vantage point at 6,555 feet. The temperature was in the 60's and there was a constant gentle breeze. Dinner was at 6PM with everyone coming at the sound of the bell. The food was delicious and there was plenty of it. Soup and cornbread, Roast Beef, mashed potatoes, green beans, fried apples, lots of hot chocolate and coffee and big chocolate chip cookies for dessert. Several of us walked back up to Cliff Top to see the Sunset which was absolutely gorgeous (wait til you see the pictures). We were entertained after dark by Margaret playing her recorder, and by a man named Everitt Whaley, 75, who was from Sevier County and told us stories about the early days of the Lodge. We talked amoung yourselves for a short time after Everitt finished, and then we all snuggled under the wool blankets and were off to a good night's sleep a the temperature fell into the high

Sunday dawned to overcast skies and breakfast was ready before we knew it and we we summoned to eat by the bell. As Vic said, "This is the way to wake up!" Pancakes with butter and syrup, Biscuits, scrambled eggs and canadian bacon, tang, hot chocolate and coffee had everybody slowly pushing away from the table. Back to the Cabin to clean up and to get ready for the trip to Newfound We set out on the Boulevard Trail, stopped briefly at the Mt. LeConte Trail Shelter, and then on up to the top of LeConte (elev. 6593'). We placed rocks on the pile at the top which as the story goes will make Mt. LeConte the second highest peak in the Smokies if it reaches 6606' (unconfirmed by writer). Several hikers took the side trail to Mrytle Point whihc was well worth the side trip. The Boulevard runs to the southeast on the top of the ridge between LeConte and Mt. Kephart. We negotiated the up and downs of the trail stopping occasionally to admire the views of North Carlina to the left and Tennessee to the right. After 5.5 miles the Boulevard junctioned with the Appalachian Trail and everyone gladly stopped to eat lunch and to rest awhile. We met several groups of hikers going both North and South with the majority going on to the LeConte Lodge. The 2.5 miles to the Gap after lunch went by quickly and we arrived at the Van around 2:30 P.M. tired but having thoroughly enjoyed the trip.

Fall Hike Day, October 1 (Joint outing TTA & TVA, LBL)

It was foggy as day broke at the Ft. Henry Hiking Trails but the day that followed was beautiful. The first registrants arrived around 9:00 a.m. and continued to come in until the noon hour. A total pf 101 persons registered for this days activities. A few came as individuals and not part of a club or group while the remainder were Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. They came from southern Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee, and northern Missouri. Only two workshops were set up due to no shows on the part of the workers. Almost every group visited with Evelyn Tretter and her Trail Etiquette work shop. Many thanks Evelyn for your unselfish gift of time.
