Natchez Trace Parkway From Start to Finish

Driving from start to finish on the Natchez Trace Parkway increases the appreciation of the road. After visiting the Ridgeland Crafts Center just north of Jackson, Mississippi, the Parkway runs out and a detour is needed. Someone from New York City or even Atlanta, Georgia might think of Jackson as just a step above a sleepy, southern town. Jackson is like life in the fast lane compared to the drive on the parkway.

The parkway allows people to study early American history and Native American, too. The rangers enforce a 50-mile per hour speed limit, but if a driver is so inclined, s/he could slow down even more and not risk being blown off the road. Traffic is sparse enough that long distance bicyclists can be seen safely traveling the roadway.

Time out can easily be taken for hikes on nature trails without driving miles off and then back on the parkway. Most walking opportunities are right outside the car window.

Parkway nature trails may be walked in five to twenty minutes. Longer hikes are available at the campgrounds located at Rocky Springs (54.8), Jeff Busby (193.1), and Merriwether Lewis

(385.9). Tishemingo State Park (303.0) is cut in half by the parkway and offers more than thirteen miles of trails plus a place for beginning rock climbers in the last rock outcroppings from the Appalachian range. It doesn't resemble the rock climbing meccas in Tennessee, but it almost seems like a mirage in Mississippi.

Picnic areas are nestled on one side of a lake and a camping area on the other. A swinging bridge fords Bear Creek which may take on river proportions at times. Tishemingo is indeed the jewel of the Mississippi park system. Other parks in Alabama, Mississippi, and Tennessee are near by, but not on the parkway itself.

The Mississippi locale at Jeff Busby is the only campground on the parkway that has food and gas. None of the parkway campgrounds charge a fee, but they don't have showers either so campers may want to seek out the locales of the state parks close to the parkway, such as David Crockett State Park in Lawrenceburg, Tennessee. Non-campers should keep in mind that it can be a good many miles between towns which offer motel accommodations, restaurants, and shopping. Study the map and locate your easiest access to such places, keeping time in mind else your needs and the road's access points come into conflict.

Many of the nature trails focus on one particular feature of the natural environment or some significant historical event. Examples some natural features of this parkway are the Loess Bluff (12.4), Owens Creek Falls (52.4), Cypress swamp (283.3), sink hole (323.9), and Jackson Falls (404.7). Jackson Falls is followed by a gap of parkway intended to lead to Nashville when complete. Trails which are related to a historical significance are, among others, Upper Choctaw Boundary (126.4), and Chickasaw Village (261.8).

Grab a handy Travel Planner before getting on the parkway. It will classify and locate for you such things as Indian history and other exhibits, the nature trails, natural features, picnic areas, water recreation to be found, and the ever important list of available restrooms (most a bit better equipped than the nearest bush or tree).

Some of the most enticing places to walk are where the Old Trace is found adjacent to the roadway. These footpaths seem to lead into the woods, but they seldom go very far. Thinking of the southern reaches of the parkway evokes memories of split rail fences and Spanish Moss dripping with humidity and providing a canopy for the Sunken Trace. Such sites can be seen near Mount Locust, one of the oldest structures in Mississippi which originated as a one-room cabin around 1780. Also, nearby is Emerald Mound which is the second largest Indian mound of its kind in the United States. All of these sights are to be found just north of historic and picturesque Natchez, Mississippi, near the parkway's southern terminus.

You cannot appreciate the Natchez trails and natural resources programs. Trace Parkway if you are in a hurry. and opportunities within Tennessee. You also cannot stop at all exhibits, The recipient may or may not be nature trails, etc., unless you have member of TTA. may be scuttled in a hurry if some sight really appeals to you.

The Natchez Trace Parkway is a good way to see a large chunk of Middle Tennessee, a small portion of northern Alabama, and a large part of Mississippi from north to south. The parkway is sure to offer unique scenery during each of the four seasons, though summer months are likely to be sweltering. If traveling in the summer, you might plan to visit all the water recreational locales which are listed in the Travel Planner.

One final note — a word of caution — to folks traveling the lower Trace. From Jackson south, warnings are posted about the indigenous poisonous snakes and fire ants. Make yourself familiar with the information on these signs since I saw some fire anthills which otherwise appeared very innocent had I not been forewarned.

Recent rains had produced lots of mushrooms including amanitas, boletes, chantarelles, russulas, crowded parchment, tree ears, stinkhorns, and false turkey-tails. Devil's Racetrack was impressive as always, and the cold watermelon Bobby Harbin had waiting at the end was most welcome.


In addition to all the fun and food, we will conduct a meeting as we prepare for the upcoming Annual Meeting in October. Everyone is welcome to attend and guests are invited.


