


The 1997 Tennessee Trails Annual Fundraising Auction will be held on Saturday evening, Nov. 1 at 8:00 pm, in the Tea Room at Norris Dam State Park. MY FAVORITE FALL HIKE The O&W Trail by Pat Anderson



An easy, 4.6 mile round trip linear trail in the Big South Fork. It is named for the old Oneida & Western Railroad, and is a portion of the John Muir Trail - blazed with his blue silhouette.

To add another 3.2 hiking miles, take the moderate Leatherwood Loop Trail blazed with a red arrow, which connects .5 miles from the trailhead. It leads

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up and over a high ridge with a spectacular view of the Big South Fork Gorge.

The O&W Trail follows the river through a beech and maple forest with some hemlock, mountain laurel, rhododendron, and white pine interspersed with gigantic rock outcroppings. The fall colors the trees display are as glorious as spring's riot of wildflowers, including yellow lady slippers.

The railroad bridge is unique for wrought iron used as structural iron, and in the south end being anchored in boulders rather than piers. Here are many good photo opportunities to catch paddlers attempting to negotiate the Class III rapids below.

If your fall hike is on an unseasonably hot day, you can enjoy a swim when returning to the Leatherwood Ford trailheads. Leatherwood Ford is located on TN 297 between Jamestown and Oneida on the east side of the long bridge over the Big South Fork River.

If you meet Howard Ray Duncan or James Smith there—say hello for me!

Attention TTA Membership-TTA Bylaw Change "Associate Organizations"

Below you will find a new bylaw to be voted on by the general membership at TTA's 1997 Annual Meeting at Norris Dam State Park. This bylaw is in response to the need for the Cumberland Trail Conference to be formally recognized by TTA. Currently, we are recognized only as a committee by the Board. There is currently no bylaw structure to allow us to exist as an associate organization under TTA's umbrella. The CTC needs this recognition and structure to support our grant writing efforts for the Cumberland Trail. This bylaw was approved by TTA's Board of Directors at their August '97 Board meeting. Please review and be prepared to vote on this issue at the annual meeting.

Bylaw 10 Associate Organizations

In order to benefit trails in Tennessee, TTA recognizes the need of its membership to form organizations within and under the parent umbrella of TTA, with such organizations having all the rights thereby guaranteed to all TTA members and their affiliated chapters. These associate organizations, formed by five or more voting members of TTA and upon approval of the TTA Board of Directors, will exist to pursue a focused trail issue, for the benefit

of said issue, and will report on such activities to TTA's Board on a bi-annual basis. The associate organization is responsible for choosing its own leadership, rules, and means to accomplish said issue. The associate organization will have a single representative on TTA's Board of Directors, and will choose that representative. The associate organization is free to seek its own financial support, is responsible for the management of said funds, and is to submit an annual financial report to TTA's Board of Directors. On dissolution of an associate organization, all leadership issues and responsibilities of said issues, and all funds of the associate organization, return to TTA for resolution.

The following amendment is proposed to Bylaw 9 in order to address financial reporting requirements to the Internal Revenue Service:

Bylaw 9

Spending of local chapter funds will be controlled by the local chapter officers. However, each chapter will provide to the state treasurer such financial information as is needed for the filing of state and federal tax returns.



TRIP REPORT by Paul Goldstein, Memphis Chapter

Greetings from South Dakota! The Goldstein has landed.

I am in a campground about 30 miles from Mt. Rushmore. I have seen the Com Palace in Mitchell, S.D. Each year when the com harvest comes in, the interior and exterior of the area is decorated in com husks, com ears, tassles and stalks made into murals. They have been doing this every year since 1890. It is pretty, but those people have way too much time on their hands! Wonder how the Cow Palace in Denver got its name and what were the murals made out of??

I spent the night in Badlands National Park in a hellacious rain and lightning and wind storm. My new tent does not leak. When the wind sent my rain fly flying, the rain came in through the no-see-um mesh at the top. The rain collected at the bottom and did not leak out. I was dreaming that I was swimming under water—only to wake up and find that I really was! I am very quick thinking and grabbed my handy bayonet and poked 4 holes in the bottom to drain it out. Otherwise, I would have had to open the door and THEN I would have gotten rained on!!!

Badlands looks like a little Grand Canyon in some spots and other spots looks like the painted desert, or Big Bend National Park in Texas. The major crops are com, sunflowers, cows and rocks. The pitiful few trees around the badlands are mostly not over 15 feet high. Once you get past Cedar Rapids though, it gets real hilly and mostly pine trees.

When it rains real hard at Mt. Rushmore, the water rushes down the faces of the presidents. They look like they have runny noses. When the wind blows and you are at the right angle, George Washington looks like he is blowing snot all over the valley below.

Tonight is the first Harvest Moon and should be impressive up here.
