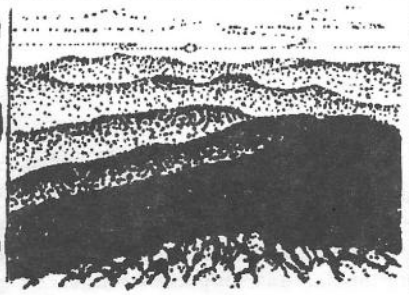

An Alternative View, and Two Cumberland Trail Hikes by Gene Curp, Nashville Chapter

"As an embassy of the Most High Light, I call forth Absolute God protection for this location. I invoke the Raspberry Sherbet Son of Divine Mother to secure this area for one mile in all directions. Thus began the TTA Annual Meeting held at Norris Darn State Park. I personally missed the opening ceremonies, but have the opening remarks given to me on good authority. A helpful hostess at the bonfire directed me to the Nashville Chapter men's cabin where I found pantyhose on the bathroom floor and a witch's costume (or her dress, whatever) on one of the beds. I consulted the hostess, Cabin 5, and the revelers in Cabin 3. Being thus assured of my sleeping arrangements, I discovered on the fold-out couch new meanings to the phrase "roughing it."

After a fine, catered country breakfast (differing from a full British breakfast by the absence of grilled tomatoes and the addition of biscuits and sausage-gravy), we separated into our various hikes. A nine-mile outing on old Section 1 of the Cumberland Trail was taken by 34 to 36 hikers and finished by 34 to 32. Luckily we didn't have an exact count and were thus saved much anxiety and waiting around. We could only take 6 cars due to limited parking, but the rule-abiding membership appeared in 8 cars. A sprint by the lead car (which contained the only 2 people who knew where we were going), and your humble reporter, and the "net gurus of the CT homepage") failed to shake anyone, so we just made do.

We hiked upwards through a "dense canopy of roots and vines and all things green" (Isn't that wonderful, a canopy of roots?) to find more climbing. Winded, but undaunted, we continued the ascent. After gaining steadily we switched back uphill, to ascend steeply. We then found the trail went up, followed by a couple of hills. Well, this is no guidebook, so suffice it to say that the entire 9 miles was all uphill. The chlorophyll morass gave way to brilliant fall colors (really) which we were unable to see due to all the rocks. All I saw was trail and rock, but it was pretty interesting rock. I did get tired of the view of my shoelaces, however. After days (in dog time, which was really only hours) most of us got out.

Dinner Saturday night was a hit. Many well-deserved awards were given out, and new officers elected. Bob Barnett then lead a 3-person tag team down the auction trail. A hiking package, a backpacking package, a canoeing package, along with art, music, accouterments, impediments, junk and cast-offs interspersed with surprise finds, genuine bargains and great B&B opportunities were auctioned. Big fun on a low budget. Next year I bring my checkbook.

It is easy by the fireside at home to draw large loops with your finger, tracing trails on maps. I want to hike X to the Nth miles that morning, followed by ... Sunday dawned just as night ended. The 9-mile Nemo Trail CT hike collapsed into the 5-mile Devil's Breakfast Table section by general consensus. 2.4 miles BRAND NEW. We were the first group to travel it. But first the TTA road rally. With red flagging tape gaily fluttering from antennae, we took off without a clue of where to go. Rob Weber lead a merry chase—and he had recited a logarithm table and swore it was the route numbers to Wartburg (pronounced Whatburg). Two men with enlarging prostates and an appetite for coffee declared biological emergencies and had to drop out of the Road Rally. After regrouping in Wartburg at the NPS Obed Visitor Center (to find the men's room out of order—two men were smug), the final leg of the road rally took on a Baja offroad race feel as the road lost paint, the pavement and after miles of washboard gravel, lost gravel. "Can't get worse without blowdowns," my rider opined. Then two blowdowns. Luckily they were just limbs mostly missing the road. We arrived at Daddys Creek.

New trail. I confess I felt "fulfilled" after helping tromp down the moss at a virgin overlook at the end of a yellow-blazed spur. I have had my turn. And, hey, it's just one stinking rock out of many, this one sacrificed to us nature lovers. I just was among those who got there first.

The trail treadway rock work was spectacular...visually, asthetically, workmanship-wise...and in steepness. It was one way in and out, yet remarkably was uphill both ways. And I happen to know not a single hiker failed to shortcut down the road to the cars (Sorry, Gene...I didn't cheat...Arleen). Desperate to get on the road, but completely lost...we waited. One could only go left or right, yet there was the long way, which was also the fastest, and the short, direct route that took longer. This sounded like 4 ways, but the only clarification we got from Rob was, for goodness sake, don't go back the way we came! A Crossville member rescued us from Rob, and lead us out to the Interstate, where the entire assemblage stopped at the very first McDonald's they came to. No kidding. Except for Bob Barnett, who was spotted across the street at Hardee's in his truck. How do you know it's Bob? One look at the bumper stickers, and after that, you just know.



1997 TENNESSEE TRAILS AWARDS

It's difficult to select a couple of individuals or organizations to receive the Tennessee Trails Award and the Bill Stutz Award, because there are so many people and organizations who consistently give of their time, money and effort to support trails in Tennessee. There are many efforts in progress around the State—Paul & Pam Miller and the Upper Cumberland Chapter's contributions to preserving Scott's Gulf; the Murfreesboro Chapter's work to preserve Black Fox Wetlands, revitalize the Twin Forks Trail, and help build the Stones River Greenway; the Nashville Chapter's work at Short Springs Natural Area; Clarksville Chapter's plans for Cheatham Dam and Indiantown Bluff; and the Memphis Chapter's trail work at Meeman-Shelby State Forest and Bagley Bottoms. The East Tennessee Chapter faithfully maintains trails in the Smokies, Hemlock Bluff, Whites Creek and other trails. The Cumberland Mountain Chapter is in the beginning stages of partnering with the Big South Fork National Recreation Area to support, promote and assist with trail building and maintenance in the Big South Fork. The Cumberland Trail Conference is spearheading an effort to build the Cumberland Trail. And the list goes on....

However, Mrs. Sally Beaman, and Lee Beaman, of Nashville rose to the top of the list to receive the Tennessee Trails Award for their generous assistance in making possible the purchase of 1,500 acres of land in rural northwest Davidson County for the Metro Nashville Parks and Greenways to preserve as a natural area. Undisturbed parcels of land of this size are a rarity in Middle Tennessee and the Beamans are to be applauded for their vision of preserving a wild place for Middle Tennesseans to enjoy.

The Bill Stutz Award is given to an individual or chapter for making a significant contribution at the State or Chapter level to the Tennessee Trails Association. Kevin Kimbro of Pegram was honored for almost seven years of maintaining the TTA membership database and literally producing miles of mailing labels for the monthly mailing of the Tennessee Trails newsletter. Kevin has also shared his love of the Bowater Pocket Wilderness trails with others by leading hikes at Virgin Falls, Honey Creek, Laurel/Snow, Piney River, etc.

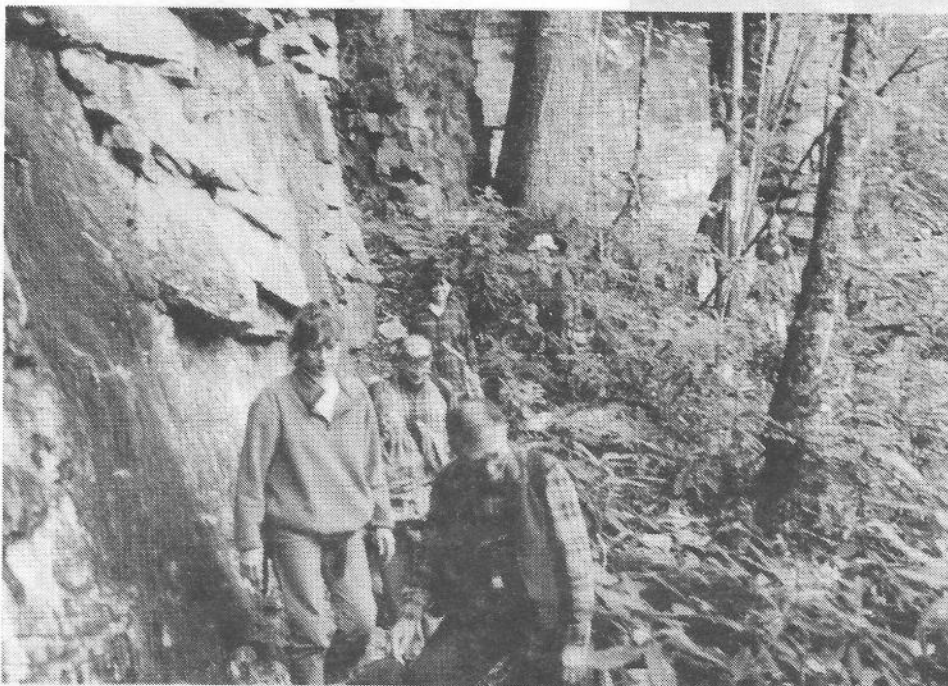

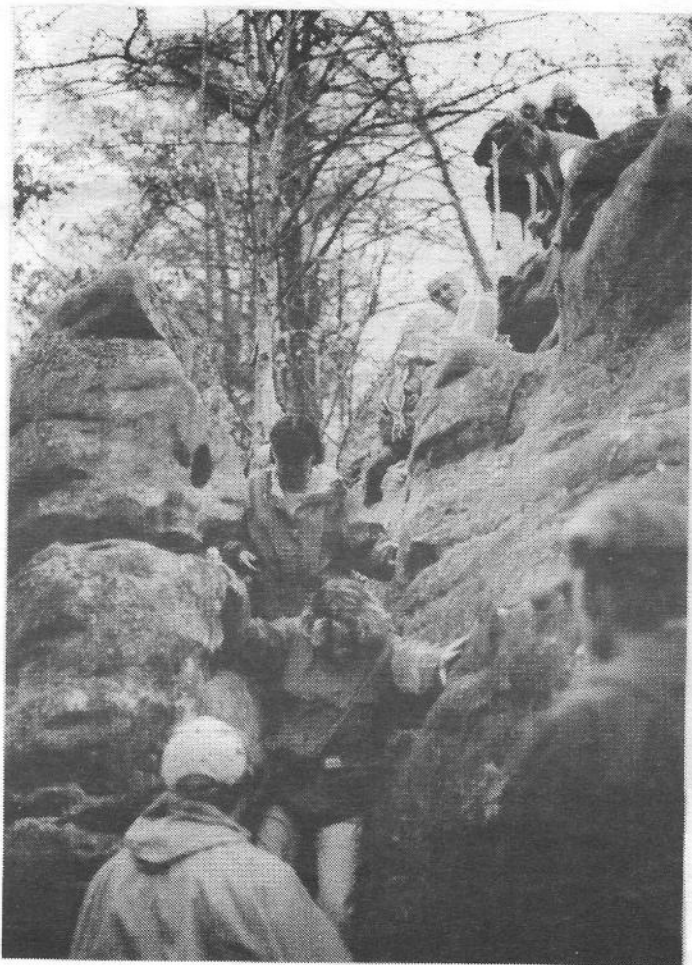

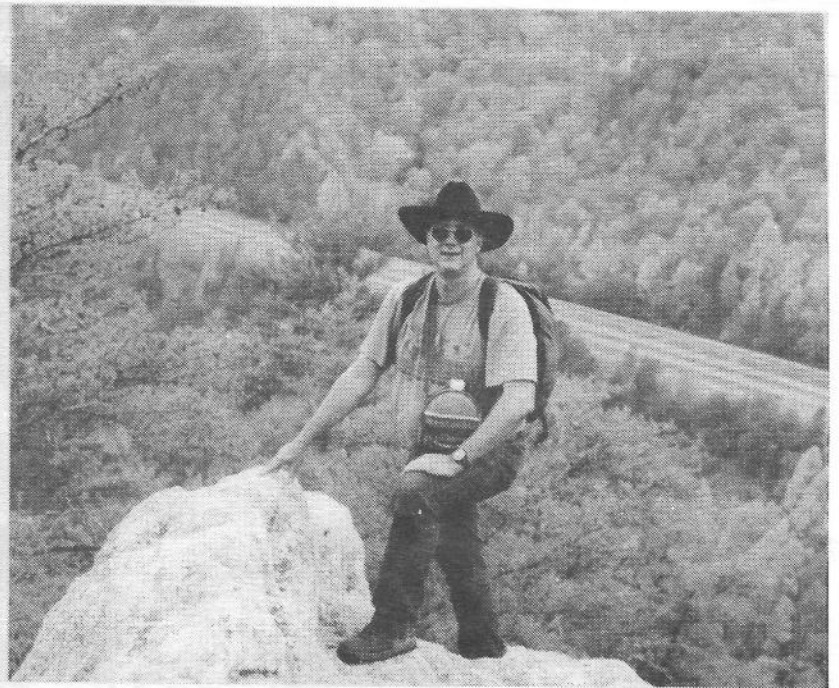

Cumberland Trail Tennessee River Gorge Segment

Thirteen people ventured out on Saturday, October 25th, to explore the Tennessee River Gorge Segment of the Cumberland Trail near Chattanooga. The adventuresome included our hike leaders, Bill Eldridge and Jim Lifsey, along with Carolyn Miller,

Leigh Jones, Bob Bowman, Susan Weber, Allan Love, Christa Underwood, Carol Tyler, Gene and Myra Holloway, and Bob and Ruth Worshik. We started the hike at the Rainbow Lake Trailhead on Signal Mountain and walked 8 moderate miles to Highway 27, where we shuttled cars. The trail was in excellent condition, all except for the first bridge crossing Middle Creek (it didn't exist as it had been washed away), so where there's a will, there's a way. Bill and Jim found some large rocks to clamber over, and along with a few helping hands, we made our way to the other side. I have since been informed that this bridge will be part of next year's Breakaway project, so...after March we'll be able to stroll across!

The trees were beautiful shades of gold and crimson, with partridge berries lining the trail and "Hearts-A-Bursting" out all over! The day started out overcast, but the fog lifted just enough during our lunch stop to view the beautiful Tennessee River from one of the many overlooks. We also crossed a LARGE swinging bridge that sent a few shivers along its boardwalk! Towards the end of the hike, mother nature decided we needed a little more rain (sundrops we called them) to enhance the already gorgeous greenery along this historic trail. We will definitely be heading back in the Spring to look at the many wildflowers! 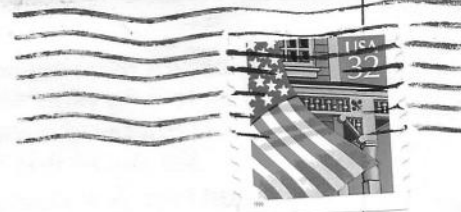
