

# National Public Lands Day at Big South Fork

n September 26, Tennessee Trails Association and the National Park Service hosted the National Public Lands Day event at the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area. A total of 20 volunteers participated. Volunteers worked on trail tread rehabilitation, vegetation removal, and waterbar repair and cleaning on four miles of hiking trails. Trails worked on were the Leatherwood Ford Loop and Sunset Overlook trails. Volunteers that signed VIP forms were from Cookeville, Oak Ridge, Norris, and Knoxville. They received a certificate and a National Public Lands Day collectable poster. Wally Linder and the other Big South Fork maintenance staff were exceptionally well organized. Volunteers were split into groups and accompanied by a maintenance staff member. This helped ensure that everyone knew their assignments and received the most from their trail experience. Following the event, a reporter from the Scott County News (local weekly paper) came, took a few pictures of the remaining volunteers and staff, and gathered information on the day. It was an unannounced visit and most of the volunteers had left.

National Public Lands Day began five years ago with three sites in three states and 200 volunteers has grown to estimates of 85 sites in 34 states with 12,000 volunteers.

#### EAST TENNESSEE

November 7 (Saturday) - Twin Arches/Charit Creek Loop (BSFNRA). This 4.6 mile loop is easily one of the more pleasant hikes within BSFNRA. We will meet at 8:30 a.m. in the parking area in front of Norris Middle School (Old Norris High School), in Norris. From there, we will car pool to the Twin Arches trailhead. For those not wanting to carpool, the trailhead may be reached by taking SR 297 west from Oneida. Go past the entrance to Bandy Creek Campground, to the intersection with SR 154. Turn right (north) on SR 154, and then right again on Divide Road. Follow Divide Road northeast for 4.2 miles and turn right (southeast) on Twin Arches Road. The trailhead is located at the end of this road, approximately 2.0 miles from the Divide Road intersection. The trail is considered moderate in difficulty, and provides access to the Twin Arches (considered one of the most significant geological features within BSFNRA). November 21 (Saturday) - Old Settlers Trail Dayhike (GSMNP) - The Old Settlers Trail wanders through old settlements along the northern boundary of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park between Greenbrier and Cosby. You'll see stone walls, foundations, and chimneys, perhaps the best collection in the park. The entire trail is 16 miles, but we'll do just 9 miles, starting at Greenbier and coming out on US321 along an unofficial access trail at Noisy Creek. Norris hikers gather in front of the Norris Middle School across from the Commons at 8:30 am. All others meet at the K-mart parking lot on Asheville Highway just north of the I-40 exit on the east end of Knoxville at 9:00 am. Call Russ Manning (494-8121).

#### September Hike Report

On a beautiful September 19th Saturday, five members and a guest in the Murfreesboro Chapter made the trek to Savage Gulf in the South Cumberland Recreation area. Traversing the "woods" branch of the Savage Day Loop we found our way to the North Rim Trail. Crossing the suspension bridge over the almost arid Meadow Creek below, a stop was made at the Savage Creek overlook to drink in some of the serenity of gulf and enjoy the cliff side breeze. One of the members noted that there was an absence of

birds as not one hawk or vulture was seen gliding the air currents below. Onward the group marched, fording a dried up Lick Creek, and stopping at Quartz Pebble Overlook to again look out over the beautiful gulf below. A large rock breakaway from the side of the opposite cliff across the gulf was noted. The age old argument ensued of was there any sound if no one was there to hear it fall. Upon reversing our directions we stopped once again at Savage Creek Overlook to enjoy a lunch as well as the cool breeze and the view below. Retracing our steps across the Meadow Creek Bridge we followed the "rim" branch of the day loop, stopping at Rattlesnake Point Overlook to enjoy the scene before us (but no rattlesnakes were seen). Then onto the spur trail to Savage Falls Overlook to see "no" water cascade over the falls, but to hear a gurgle of only a trickle of flow in the distance. Without an appreciable flow of water a decision was made to pass up a trek down to the falls.
