

"DON'T leave home without it."

What good will a green plastic credit card do you 20 miles from the nearest paved road? What do you really need when out away from civilization?

Experienced outdoor enthusiasts know what items are most important to bring - even for short walks or hikes out of base camp. The "10 Essentials" are items that cannot be improvised from materials lying on the forest floor. To be found without these few items, even only a few miles from car, camp or cabin, can spell disaster. The "Ten Essentials" are the end-product of years of hard-won experience. They are intended to help outdoor enthusiasts avoid getting into trouble in the first place, and, if that doesn't work, to minimize the damage.

The standard list of 10 essentials varies slightly depending on which source you go to. For example, the Boy Scouts, Sierra Club, and The Seattle Mountaineers', each have their own lists, yet they all incorporate the same basic items.

The following list is not to be considered cast in concrete - each outdoor enthusiast should customize his or her own kit for the barest minimum of supplies. Note that the first three items are for finding your way, the second three are for your protection, and the last four are for emergencies.

- 1. Map
- 2. Compass
- 3. Flashlight, extra batteries and bulb
- 4. Hat, sunglasses, bug repellant, gloves
- WATER!!! And a way to purify water. Extra food.
- Clothing: raingear, socks, sweater, space[™] blanket
- 7. Matches / lighter, candle / fire starter
- 8. Mirror, whistle
- 9. Pocket knife
- 10. 1st aid kit: moleskin, antibiotic ointment, medications.
- Always tell someone else your hiking plans
- Use your common sense

By avoiding unnecessary problems and dangers you will save on your own personal wear and tear, and probably get back home in one piece. However, if something does come up, at least you know you've got those 10 important items stowed away in your pack.

Letters from Libby President

Dear friends,

Many of you may have heard about the February 3rd announcement by Govenor Don Sundquist that eight state parks closed: website announcement: www.state.tn.us/environment/closings.htm. The parks targeted for closure are Big Hill Pond, Bledsoe Creek, Burgess Falls, Dunbar Cave, Fort Loudon, Fort Pillow, House Mountain, Indian Mountain, and the Inn/Restaurant at Reelfoot Lake. At the February 8th House Conservation and Environment Committee meeting Commissioner Hamilton, Commissioner of Tennessee's Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC), stated that the parks might not be closed, but managed in a drastically different way. I feel so shocked and saddened by this and hope that something will be done so that these parks will not be lost from public use. Most of us do not claim to be politically active, yet this presents an opportunity for us to learn:

...learn to become politically aware and see what our representatives are doing for the environment. Visit the TDEC www.state.tn.us/environment

...learn who your representatives are and if you don't agree with what their doing, write them (they all have e-mail)

Erin Kelley, with the Environmental Action Fund (EAF) has listed the following points you might want to consider before you write.

- 1. No set criteria for determining which parks would close. (Bledsoe Creek is a very popular park and had received \$300,000 in maintenance funds last year.)
- 2. Limited savings. (The plan proposes to move Park employees to other parks, resulting in no savings, and there would be a great cost in "mothballing" and closing the parks.)
- 3. Closing the parks would hurt state revenues. Our parks are top visitor attractions in the state.

We need to be more aware of political decisions because they affect all our lives. Commissioner Hamilton stated that if the Governor's budget was not passed as it is written there would be 6-7 more parks that would have to be closed. Express your feelings, and become more aware of the state's budget and tax issues. You won't know how much you've appreciated something until you find it has be taken away.
