The Clarksville Chapter would like to invite everyone affiliated with TTA, CTC and TRAC to attend our next Annual meeting. This year we'll meet in the beautiful surroundings of Land Between the Lakes (LBL). For anyone not familiar with LBL, located in northwest Tennessee, there are more than 200 miles of hiking trails and abandoned roads meandering through backwoods, fields and alongside peaceful lakeshores. In addition to hiking there are plenty of other places to explore. For example, the Elk & Bison Prairie, a very special place where a native habitat lost more than a century ago is being carefully restored. The Golden Pond Planetarium and Observatory, where novice astronomers can learn how to identify the constellations on a simulated night sky. At The Homeplace-1850 you'll visit a rural Tennessee farm, much as it would have appeared in the mid-19th century.

The Smoky Mountain Segment, when completed, will wind its way 30-40 miles from Cove Lake State Park to the northeast corner of Frozen Head State Park through the Cumberland Mountains in Campbell, Scott, Morgan and Anderson Counties. This addition to the Cumberland Trail greenway has been under construction since March, and is being built with the assistance of individual volunteers, an AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps (NCCC) team, a National Sierra Club Service Trip, and the Cumberland Trail BreakAway program. More program outings are scheduled on this segment this fall...watch your newsletter!

I would especially like to thank Faith Dippold, of the Cove Lake Chapter, for her assistance with organizing this event. I would also like to acknowledge the "LaFollette Press" and the "Knoxville News Sentinel" as they attributed so much to the success of this hike via their wonderful press coverage of the event. Also, thanks to Bill Eldridge, Arleen Scheller, and Rob Weber, of the Plateau Chapter, who helped lead the hike, and the AmeriCorp NCCC Red 4 Team who helped so much throughout the day by assisting hikers down the mountain while showing off their beautiful trail building work! We also appreciated AmeriCorps providing the much-needed refreshments of freshbaked cookies and lemonade when we reached the bottom!

This beautiful new trail, cresting Cross Mtn. at over 3,000 feet, is in need of foot traffic to pack the surface; we call it "stomping"! Hiking is the best trail maintenance there is! CTC would like to invite everyone to come hike the Smoky Mtn. Segment this fall and winter, and as for next spring... there are wildflowers on top of Cross Mountain that rival those at Frozen Head State Park...we kid you not!!! The hike to the crest of Cross Mtn. includes winter views of Powell Valley and Cove Lake, falling water, and wonderful rockwork! Early April to early May appears to be the peak time for flowers on Cross Mtn., depending on your trail elevation. Camping will soon be available on the Montgomery Fork watershed on the backside of Cross Mtn., for those wanting to spend the night.

Please remember that while this trail corridor is open yearround, you must wear 500 square inches of blaze orange (head and chest) during BIG game hunts. Please check the Cumberland Trail website: http://users.multipro.com/cumberlandtrail or the TWRA website http://www.state.tn.us/twra before heading out on the trail for the current hunting schedule, which will be available after July 15th.

On Friday, September 15, 11 a.m. EDT, ribbon-cutting ceremony at the Nemo Bridge near Wartburg, followed by a picnic lunch and a short easy hike on the Cumberland Trail from Nemo Bridge to Alley Ford. We have tentative commitments from Governor Sundquist, TDOT Commissioner Bruce Saltsman, and TDEC Commissioner Milton Hamilton to be there, along with other local and state officials, who will join the scores of volunteers who helped create the Obed Wild & Scenic River Segment and hikers who want to experience the beauty and challenges of the Obed River and Daddy's Creek.

On Saturday, September 16, a 13-mile through-hike of the Obed Segment will be offered, as well as some shorter hikes on various sections. Come see BreakAway Bluff, named after the BreakAway college students who built 2 ½ miles of trail to an incredible overlook on the Obed; Morgan's Overlook, lovingly built by inmates from Morgan County Regional Correctional Facility; Enterprise Rock, a fantastic balanced rock that looks like an aircraft carrier; the Turkey Creek bridge engineered and built by some tough volunteers who had to drag telephone poles incredible distances and across a gorge; raging river rapids and inviting deep pools. Have we enticed you yet?
