Governor Sundquist will be the honored guest as we celebrate the Cumberland Trail's designation as Tennessee's Millennium Legacy Trail. Celebrate the preservation of the historic Nemo Bridge as a pedestrian crossing for the Cumberland Trail State Park (CTSP), and "cut the ribbon" on the newly completed 14-mile core Obed Wild & Scenic River segment of the CT.

Friday's activities include a ceremony at 11 a.m. (EDT), followed by a picnic lunch and an easy 2-mile hike on the Obed segment of the CTSP.

On Saturday, the Cumberland Trail Conference will offer a 14-mile through hike, an overnight backpack of the Obed, as well as some shorter hikes so as many people as possible can enjoy the beauty of the Obed.

Edgar Evins State Park Update

The major one for the hikers took place at 1 PM at the trailhead of our brand new hiking trail: Jack L. Clayborn Millennium Trail.

Ranger Wayne Morrison and Murfreesboro's Chapter Chairman Fount Bertram dedicated the trail to the future. This is the first of many trails that are on the drawing board for this lovely and accessible park. Enthusiasm ran high among those gathered for the dedication and the first official hike ever.

## IN MEMORIAM

Brian Brown, who was the driving force behind the establishment of TTA's new Northwest Chapter, was tragically killed in a biking accident in Martin, TN, on July 18<sup>th</sup>, while training for a triathlon.

He is survived by his wife, Laura, and two children, Georgia and Boone.

Brian, 32, was a native of Crossville, and a graduate of the University of Tennessee at Martin. He had served as assistant director of Student Life for Campus Recreation at the university since 1992. In this capacity, he was very active in encouraging young people at the university to become interested and involved in all sorts of outdoor activities, including hiking. Students from his program were responsible for constructing a biking and hiking trail at one of TWRA's fishing lakes in Weakley County. Brian was also working on a "greenway project" that would be for multiple use along a railroad right of way. Brian was also very excited about the progress the CTC had made on the Cumberland Trail, since it passed through his home county, and was looking forward to being able to work with his students and participating in its completion.

Brian had initiated discussions with TTA about 3 years ago with the thought of forming a TTA chapter centered around the students in his campus recreation program, but also including other hikers from the Martin community and surrounding area. These discussions came to fruition this past April, when Brian, with the encouragement of Jerry Lenski, TTA's West Tennessee regional rep, and Suva Bastin, Clarksville's chapter chair, organized a group of hikers that voted to petition the TTA Board for chapter status. On May 20, that petition was granted, and the Northwest chapter was formed. Their inaugural hike was held on May 6<sup>th</sup> on the Fort Henry trails at Land Between the Lakes.

Brian's passing was tragic, but his legacy will continue as the Northwest chapter grows and thrives while promoting the ideals and goals of TTA.

Brian also served as the chairman of the Weakley County Chapter of the American Red Cross. Memorials in his name can be sent to the Red Cross at 209 Fonville Street, Martin, TN, 38237.

Rail Roadbed Between Jackson and Nashville May Be Converted Into a Rail-Trail

In Jackson, TN., within current history, there have been 8 abandonments of rail lines that once served the city. TRAC hopes that sufficient community interest can be mounted so that the unused rights-of-way might be converted to rail-trails as area projects.

The still-standing Jackson depot of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railroad (N.C.& St.L.) is mute testimony to the bygone days when the platform would bustle with travelers enroute east to Nashville or west to Memphis. TRAC points out that the abandoned 67 mile line toward Memphis could be a rail-trail, bringing new life, commerce, and health opportunities to all in the communities along the way. The city station which is now a railroad museum could serve as a rail-trail headquarters, attracting local residents as well as rail-trail enthusiasts from afar interested in railroad lore and memorabilia, as well as a jump-off point to enjoy the many healthy activities found on a rail-trail such as bicycling, jogging, and walking.

The line from Memphis to Jackson was built by the Tennessee and Midland Railway and opened in sections between 1888 and 1889. Eventually it became part of a through route from Paducah, Kentucky, to Memphis. In 1895 it was purchased by the Louisville and Nashville Railroad (which already had a line to Memphis north of Jackson) and leased to the N.C. & St.L, an L&N affiliate, which ran directly west from Nashville and met the purchased line. With this acquisition the L&N controlled duplicate rail lines to Memphis, the one through Jackson and the one to the north. Apparently the L&N wanted to protect its business to Memphis and prevent a rival from getting a foothold.

The railroads operated independently until 1957 when the N.C. & St.L. was merged into the L&N and freight traffic between Nashville and Memphis was routed via the northern L&N line rather than through Jackson. The new route was 10 miles shorter. The Jackson route continued with a single passenger train and local freights into the 1960's. In late summer 1967, in spite of local resistance, the Interstate Commerce Commission gave permission to abandon the right-of-way between Cordova, 17 miles out of Memphis, and a site close to the Jackson depot. The rails were removed by the following year.

Because of noted interest into the conversion of some or all of the rail roadbed into a Rail-Trail, Bert Schappell of TRAC prepared this history of the railroad line between Jackson and Nashville.




