

The hard work of the dedicated volunteers from the Columbia and Nashville chapters that organized and hosted the meeting, the Park's unparalleled natural beauty and outstanding hiking opportunities, the fantastic fall weather and beautiful leaf color all contributed to this success. But the real success of the meeting can be measured in the spirit and enthusiasm of the hikers that came to our annual get-together – hikers from all parts of the state, from Jonesborough to Memphis, from Chattanooga to Clarksville.

Evan Means Small Grants Program Request Deadline Dec 31, 2002

In February 2003, TTA's Board of Directors will award small grants memorializing Evan Means. The grants support special volunteer projects that are compatible with the chartered objectives of TTA: promoting and developing a system of hiking trails in Tennessee as well as working for the conservation of natural resources. Project proposals are due no later than December 31, 2002.

All chapters are encouraged to look within their local area, identify a special trail or park project, request and submit a formal grants application for the February 2003 Evan Means Small Grant Program Award.

Grant requests in the range of \$300-\$600 are encouraged. However, if a project requires additional grant money, considerations will be made.

Some 140 people – a record number – registered for the meeting and participated in the various events of the weekend. We offered 8 scheduled hikes of various lengths and difficulties, and nearly everyone present participated in one or more of these. One hike had more than 45 people signed up! Several impromptu hikes were also arranged to satisfy the desires for even more hikes.

At the fund-raising auction on Saturday night, there were more than 60 successful bidders. Many others, including staff and non-TTA guests of Fall Creek Falls, participated in the white elephant and bake sales. Auction highlights include: the <u>Story of Shorts</u> vol. II and his/her further adventures with Fran; wonderful artwork donated by Nancy Juodenas; the bidding war over the Grand Canyon trip; the fourth or fifth incarnation of Tennessee Trails-Opoly; the huge participation by commercial donors; an antique bathtub demonstration; thin mint Girl Scout cookies selling for \$50, and of course Vera's Brownies! The most impressive number of all is that the auction raised a record \$6,487, which was donated to the Cumberland Trail Conference to support their 2003 BreakAway programs. The hikers that were at the annual meeting, as well as those that couldn't make it, are a part of TTA because they believe in our mission of promoting and developing a statewide system of hiking trails. Over the past few years, we have attracted more and more like-minded folks to our cause. In November 1998, the TTA board challenged the organization to reach "1000 by 2000" – to grow the membership from 600 to 1,000 by the beginning of the new century. Well, we missed that original goal by a couple of years, but at the November 2002 board meeting, it was reported that our membership now stands at 1,013!

In 1998, TTA consisted of 8 chapters across the state. Since then we have planted chapters at Columbia, at Cove Lake, in the Northwest, on the Highland Rim, and at Cumberland Gap. At its November meeting, the TTA board accepted a petition from hikers in the Soddy Daisy area of Hamilton County to create our 14th chapter!

We have every reason to believe that TTA will continue to attract new people and will continue to grow and will continue to have an impact on hiking in Tennessee. The success of the Cumberland Trail State Park, the successful involvement of TRAC in promoting rail-to-trail conversions, the success of our Small Grants Program in encouraging volunteerism in other organizations, and now TTA's participation in the Southeast Regional Foot Trails Coalition are all sure to generate further interest in our activities.

In a forward looking effort to prepare for this growth, the TTA board is considering organizational structure changes to allow quicker and more focused response to trail issues, and to more effectively use our volunteer leadership. Regardless of the direction that is ultimately taken, the TTA organization will continue to need enthusiastic and inspired leadership. Again, the board is proactively looking at ways to develop this leadership from within our ranks.

"Gorgeous Gorges" Final Payment Due

TTA members and a host of donors rose to the occasion to help make our June 30, 2002 payment for the 5,000 acres of "Gorgeous Gorges" for the Cumberland Trail - and we thank you! We are asking for your help again with the final payment of \$300,000 due December 31, 2002. If you have not made a donation for the *Pathways for People*, *People for Nature* campaign yet, now would be a good time to do it.

Our success in meeting our obligations for the Gorgeous Gorges acquisition and the 300-acre Black Mtn. Western Slope purchase has moved us forward in negotiations for several additional major acquisitions in 2003. The Pathways for People, People for Nature campaign statewide total now stands at \$1.6 million towards our goal of \$3 million.

And, we have exciting plans to build the 30 miles of trail in these "Gorgeous Gorges" in 2003 during **THE BIG DIG** event. The next issue of the <u>The Cumberland Trail</u> newsletter (mailing in December) will contain more information.

"Stump Jump" Report

You can hike the Cumberland Trail . . . OR, you can run it! Which is exactly what 146 people did in October on the Tennessee River Gorge Seament of the CT. On October 5. runners from all over the nation, including Arizona, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Alabama, and Georgia, came to Chattanooga to run an 11-mile and 50K Ultra Marathon on the Cumberland Trail. The top finisher for the 50K race was Tom Sell of Signal Mtn., TN (4:58:31). Other top finishers were Tim Lee of Cullman, AL (4:59:28), and Mat Kirk of High Point, NC (5:22:43). First place for the 11-mile race went to Jay Korff of Nashville (1:32:36); 2^d place James Wood of Chattanooga (1:37:00), and 3rd Brenda Simril of Ooltewah, TN (1:37:08). Everyone returned safely and raved about how beautiful the trail was. "Hike Against Hunger" Report

HIKE REPORT:

On Nov 9, Richard Helm led a group of eight hikers to Van Hook Falls on one of the most beautiful sections of the Sheltowee Trace near London, KY. Mild weather and recent rains provided for a treat of a 6-mile hike, which brought us past several delightful waterfalls. This trail crosses several streams on fine, elevated rock steps, travels through a lovely hemlock forest, and passes along the rim of a cliff over Pounder Creek gorge. Then it makes its way beside rockhouses, along a mountain laurel ridge, and comes out on an open rock bald, before it drops down to scenic Cane Creek. Just beyond this Creek was our destination, Van Hook Falls, which drops about 20 feet off a flat rock shelf into a lush rhododendron basin. After exploring the falls, we made our way back to Cane Creek, where we took our lunch break on its rock ledge, the fickle sun teasing our backs with warmth. Coming back the same way, we made good time and arrived at the cars around 2:30. It was generally agreed that this was one of the nicest hikes our chapter has had in a long time.

Maintaining a particular trail or section of trail?

Through the cooperation of land managers, who periodically inform us of volunteer opportunities, TTA can put you in touch with several Adopt-A-Trail programs, or offer suggestions on how to approach local land managers in your area.

The Adopt-A-Trail program is quite simple and flexible. Volunteers or chapters select the trail they wish to adopt and at the same time determine the level of trail maintenance they wish to undertake. Their only commitment is to hike, inspect, and report on the trail's conditions and maintenance needs twice per year. Light trail maintenance (clipping, pruning, trash and minor blow-down removal) is encouraged during each inspection. Serious trail problems identified will be reported to the local land management agency for resolution.
