# Sign Me Up Today for Spring Breakaway

Hope everyone had enough holiday cheer and you're stoked to build some trail in the spring! The 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Spring BreakAway Program will be underway February 27 – March 26 at the fabulous Dogwood Lodge in Soddy Daisy TN. As of today we have 18 colleges and universities, an Americorp team, and a high school group, which totals about 250 students. Each school will spend a week for their spring break during the 4-week program. We need you to make plans to help complete the Rock/Possum/Soddy Segment of the Cumberland Trail. What do you need?

Trail builders — We need experienced and not-so-experienced trail builders to help lead these students out on the trail. Trail building is fun and anyone can do it, but students need guidance and direction from people who have done it before.

Kitchen Crew – Anyone who has been on our programs, know how important this job is. The people in the kitchen cook and prepare food, do the grocery shopping, and make sure that there is enough food for everyone. Many of the same people that helped last year are back, but I'm sure your help will be needed.

Adopt-A-Food — If you are unable to be at the program, you can still participate as an individual/TTA chapter. In January, we will be contacting the TTA Chapters to be in charge of raising food items. This worked out great last year and gave everyone the opportunity to help out. We will assign each chapter a food item to purchase. I will make arrangements to pickup the food items from your chapter before BreakAway. If you would rather donate funds and let us take care of purchasing, that would be great as well.

## \$2 million in federal funds to go toward preserving hiking trail

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -- A mammoth spending bill Congress recently passed includes \$2 million that will be used to preserve the historic Fiery Gizzard Trail.

The money approved last month will buy about 4,000 acres of the private land the hiking trail crisscrosses.

The Fiery Gizzard, part of the South Cumberland State Recreation Area, is between Monteagle and Tracy City, about 35 miles northwest of Chattanooga.

The trail is 12.3 miles long, leading past one hemlock that is estimated to be 500 years old, rock chimney formations and a 70-foot waterfall.

The Civilian Conservation Corps built much of the trail, 90 percent of which is on private property, during the Depression.

The late Marvin Runyon, former postmaster general and top executive at the Tennessee Valley Authority, and Sen. Lamar Alexander, R-Tenn., were among those who helped to secure the federal money.

"Marvin and I fell in love with the South Cumberland Plateau in the 1980s," said Sue Atkinson, Runyon's widow. "We spent a great deal of time on the mountain and came to appreciate what a totally unique resource our state has."

#### HIKE REPORTS

On November 5-7, eight members from our chapter joined the other 148 attendees of TTA's annual meeting at Pickwick Landing's State Park. We participated in hikes at Tishomingo State Park in Mississippi and Shiloh National Battle Field. The weather could not have been better for hiking. Marvin Cain was personally responsible for record proceeds from the live auction. Throwing caution to the wind Marvin raised the bidding to \$75 for an \$8 camp pillow. When questioned about his actions Cain's response was "But it matches my pack perfectly!" Please see December's newsletter and Page 4 for a complete report of the meeting.

On November 20, Rick Lausten led 15 members from four chapters on a hike of The Walls of Jericho. Members from Murfreesboro, Nashville and the Upper Cumberland met Columbia/Franklin members in Winchester then caravaned to the trail head a mile south of the Tennessee-Alabama border. Rick reports that the hike was a challenging seven miles with an elevation change of 1130 feet. From the trailhead we hiked a very well marked trail to Turkey Creek where we changed into our "Waldies" before fjording the creek. On the other side was a level, grassy meadow where troops of Boy Scouts had pitched their camp. A sign led us around the camp sight, along a stream to a gap in a barbed wire fence. Here is where the hike gets tough! The trail goes up to the Walls and it is muddy, slippery and treacherous. Trekking poles or a good hiking staff are a must. The trail is getting washed out and there are spots on it where it is really a tough hike. Several of us slipped and fell on the trail. A bout 100 yards from the Walls, as the trail ends there is a steep decent down a muddy slope to the creek. Someone had left a rope that we used to aid our decent. It would be a good idea to take a rope if anyone hikes here in case this one disappears. I don't know how we would decent without the rope. or acceded on our way back. Once you reach the creek and the Walls the scenery is simply spectacular. Steep cliffs surround the creek, hence the name The Walls of Jericho. Deep scours, a sink, water spewing from a narrow cave, words fail to adequately describe The Walls of Jericho. After retracing our rout to the trail head nine of us opt for dinner at the Davy Crockett Roadhouse in Manchester.

On November 26, two members from our chapter joined the Murfreesboro and Highland Rim chapters for the annual After Thanksgiving Day tradition. We hiked three miles at Old Stone Fort Archeological State Park in Manchester, TN. The weather made this another great day for hiking in Tennessee. After our hike, we returned to our favorite restaurant, Crockett Roadhouse for lunch.

#### Have You Considered ... Maintaining a particular trail or section of trail?

Through the cooperation of land managers, who periodically inform us of volunteer opportunities, TTA can put you in touch with several Adopt-A-Trail programs, or offer suggestions on how to approach local land managers in your area.

The Adopt-A-Trail program is quite simple and flexible. Volunteers or chapters select the trail they wish to adopt and at the same time determine the level of trail maintenance they wish to undertake. Their only commitment is to hike, inspect, and report on the trail's conditions and maintenance needs twice per year. Light trail maintenance (clipping, pruning, trash and minor blowdown removal) is encouraged during each inspection. Serious trail problems identified will be reported to the local land management agency for resolution.
