A <u>motion was passed</u> to submit to the membership an amendment to the constitution adding a president-elect to the list of officers.

A <u>motion was passed</u> to submit to the membership an amendment to the by-laws making the Bill Stutz award official.

Thirty-day notification of these amendments had been given via the minutes of the board meeting of June 22, 1985, copy of which went to all chapter chairmen and other board members.

The nomimation chairman, Ken Pittman, announced the following slate of officers for 1986: president, David Stidham; vice president, Bob Barnette; president-elect, Howard Ray Duncan (contingent on passing of amendment to constitution); corresponding secretary-treasurer, Dot Lingerfelt; recording secretary, Evelyn Tretter; director to replace Grimes Slaughter, whose term is expiring, David Rhyne, Carroll Viera, J. T. Jones, Warren Dixon.

The president, David Stidham, said he has started the action to get Falling Water Falls State Natural Area near Chattanooga reopened, as voted by the board at the meeting of June 22, 1985.

The board passed a motion to put classified ads for members in the newsletter free of charge.

Dot Lingerfelt agreed to talk with Chattanooga members to see if they will host the annual meeting in 1986, it being that chapter's turn. A tentative date of Oct. 11-12-13, 1986, was set.

It was announced that Bertha Chrietzberg will lead her usual annual canoe trip on Stones River Nov. 2, 1985. The write-up missed the October newsletter.
