Board meeting minutes from 4th quarter 1999 were read and approved with the following two changes:

- 1. Mike Harvey is to be added to the membership handbook committee
- 2. The board authorized up to \$3,000.00 for funding in the Evan Means small grant program

TREASURER'S REPORT (James Leininger) Our account is up considerably due mainly to annual membership renewals. Our largest outgoing expense continues to be the newsletter. Projected bank balance at the end of 2000 is @\$12,000.00 - half of which is in non-liquid status. We are still in good financial shape.

TENNESSEE CONSERVATION VOTERS – Formerly called EAF (Herb Kneeland)
Herb is TTA's rep to this lobbying organization. There are over 200 environmental bills in the legislature now and individual support is always encouraged. We can support by: writing our state reps, giving financial support, and getting other organizations to join the Tennessee Conservation Voters.

EVAN MEANS SMALL GRANT PROGRAM (Libby Francis) The grant committee has received and approved four applications for funds. We will be awarding grant checks around the first of March. The grants awarded are:

\$200.00 for trail maps at Obed Wild & Scenic area

\$400.00 for trail maps at Grassy Cove

\$630.00 for bridge repair at Shelby Farms

\$400.00 for trail repair at Meeman-Shelby Forest

TTA BOARD VACANCIES (Libby Francis) We have a person in mind for the Middle Tennessee Regional Rep position. If the person can shift their work schedule around they'll be able to accept the position. We should know the outcome in 2-3 weeks. We are also starting to search for a treasurer. James Leininger will be vacating the treasurer position effective January 2001. We don't necessarily need a CPA, but would need someone with experience in working with non-profit organizations. It would remain a volunteer (non-paid) position. Anyone with possible candidates should talk with Libby.

MEMBERSHIP DIRECTORY (Jim Poteet) Target date for new directories still remains March 2000. These will go to all currently paid up TTA members. E-mail addresses we have will be included. Judy Woods is working on advertisement for the directory.

CHAPTER REPORTS

<u>Big South Fork</u> (Fount Bertram) The BSF chair person was out of town and gave Fount a report to read regarding the chapter. BSF has added 6 new members and has appointed Peter Erickson as new vice chair.

<u>Clarksville</u> (Suva Bastin) They have completed a hike schedule through June and things are going well. They have new visitors each month.

Columbia (Russell Smith) Columbia has completed their hike schedule for the next several months.

Cove Lake was not represented at this board meeting.

<u>East Tennessee</u> (Keith Mertz) They have had two hikes in January. They've also planned two hikes per month for the rest of the year. Arleen Scheller will be doing their March program.

Memphis (Gloria Norrid) They're doing a lot of hiking and doing a lot of combination hikes with other TTA chapters. Their March program will be J.R. Tate's AT presentation.

Murfreesboro (Fount Bertram) All their programs for the rest of the year have been scheduled. They're having good participation in their hikes. Hosting the 1999 Annual Meeting has been a great "shot in the arm" for them. They've been very involved in

writing letters to the state reps regarding the possible closing of some of our state parks and recreation areas.

Nashville (Anne Wesley) Jennifer Hann has been doing great getting programs scheduled for the Nashville chapter. Elizabeth Gerlock and Judy Woods are busy getting Nashville's hike schedule completed for the year. Jim Johnson donated a pair of two-way radios to the Nashville chapter. They have a 1-1/2 mile range. They'll be great for hike leaders to use in keeping their hiking group together. (No Golden Squirrel awards for the Nashville chapter???) Nashville is also trying to do more advertising to become more visible in the area.

<u>Plateau</u> (Susan Weber) Susan reported for the Plateau chapter chair. They've added 6 new members. They have also enlisted some help to follow up on people who've let their membership expire. They're averaging 14-35 people per hike. CTC may do a joint outing with them for trail days this year.

<u>Upper Cumberland</u> (Ninez Giles) Ninez reported for the Upper Cumberland chapter by reading a letter from Denise Charvoz. They have had some hikes, but are still searching for a full time chair person.

REGIONAL REP REPORTS

West Tennessee (Jerry Lenski) A joint hike was held January 15th with Clarksville and UT/Martin. They're also working on another LBL hike. Enthusiasm for a UT/Martin chapter is strong and should be able to form in the near future. Work is also being done on opening a new chapter in Jackson.

Middle Tennessee This vacancy has not been filled yet.

East Tennessee (Rob Weber) Rob reported for Arleen Scheller who was out of town. They're working on a new chapter in the Rockwood/Harriman area. The potential looks good for this area.

ASSOCIATE ORGANIZATION REPORTS

Cumberland Trail Conference (Rob & Susan Weber) The 1999 yearly financial report and a quarterly report of goals and objectives were handed out to the board members. They're working on adding two positions. One position would be a program intern for @8-9 month assignment and the other position a watershed intern for the Bowater project. They continue to work on land acquisitions. Sandra Spearman handed out a CT Volunteer Program listing for 2000, which included information on this year's Breakaway program. The CT is kicking off their capital campaign with an auction on April 8th in Oak Ridge. Their goal is to raise \$30-35,000.00 from the auction.

TRAC (Charlie Tate) Due to bad weather and illnesses, their last three meetings have been cancelled. Charlie will be the TTA board representative for TRAC. He plans on getting with their members in the next few weeks and will have more to report at our next meeting.

MEMBERSHIP (Ninez Giles) We've had a lot of renewals and new folks added to our membership. Currently she shows 594 active members. Anyone with names of state reps or state parks that we need to add to our complimentary newsletter mailing list should contact Ninez.

TTA SLIDE SHOW (Fount Bertram) This committee is experiencing very slow progress on the slide show project. Hopefully there will be something to show this summer. Work continues.

WASHINGTON D.C. LOBBY TRIP (Susan Weber) This trip was approved last board meeting and will take place on March 14th & 15th, 2000. Vera Churcher will be going as the TTA representative and Susan Weber will represent Cumberland Trail Conference. Susan said arrangements have been made and they're setting up meetings with state reps.

INTERNET (Barry Spearman) After researching the Altrek site mentioned last board meeting, Barry said he didn't think it'd be a good venue for TTA. We will not pursue it any further.

MEMBERSHIP HANDBOOK (Anne Wesley) The outline has been completed and work will continue on the project.

BUSINESS CARD COMMITTEE (Anne Wesley) Anne is working on these in Print Shop. Some Nashville ones have been done and she's still working on the rest.

NEW BUSINESS

NEWSLETTER ISSUES (Diane Manas) The 10th of the month is our newsletter information deadline. Diane asked that everyone try their best to meet it. She also asked that when information is sent in you include where it's coming from and when. Ninez Giles is our contact for anyone wanting extra newsletters and all name and/or address changes. Ninez is to receive all membership checks too.

TTA LOGO (Alan Stokes) In order to keep uniformity and integrity in our TTA logo, Alan distributed free discs of the logo to all who could use it.

NATIONAL TRAIL DAYS (Libby Francis) This year's theme is "Celebrate Millennium Trails." Several chapters have already planned special events for this.

LIABILITY WAIVER (Libby Francis) Libby handed out waivers for all chapters to take and pass on to all hike leaders. Every TTA hike should have this form completed before the hike begins. This is a mandatory procedure. The waivers help up get names and addresses on visitors and also protects TTA and shuttle drivers.

NEXT BOARD MEETING (Libby Francis) The next board meeting will be Saturday and Sunday May 20 & 21, 2000 at Reelfoot. The Memphis chapter is handling the details and have already reserved some rooms at the Airpark Inn.
