Tennessee Trails Association 2nd Quarter 2002 Board Meeting Minutes

May 18, 2002

The Tennessee Trails Association Second Quarter Board Meeting opened at 1 p.m. on May 18, 2002, in the Chickasaw Chalet, Henderson, Tennessee, 18 miles south of Jackson and near Chickasaw State Park. Present (noted in alphabetical order) were:

WELCOME—The meeting opened with a welcome from Leigh Jones, TTA president, and a round of introductions from all present.

APPROVAL OF FIRST QUARTER MINUTES—The Board Meeting minutes from the 1st Quarter 2002 (February 16, 2002) meeting were approved with one change: Clarification that the proposal for the Brighton Elementary Walking Trail was not awarded. A sheet listing the Evan Means Grant Awards was distributed with notations of grants awarded as follows: 1.) Chickasaw Trail Restoration, \$600.00; 2) Eagle Pass Bridge, Ashland City, \$500.00; 3) Landmark Volunteer Program, Crossville, \$600.00; 4.)Massengale Homeplace Trail, Rugby, \$500.00; 5) Meeman Shelby Forest Trail Signs, Millington, \$400.00; 6) Outdoor Classroom/Walking Trail, Girls Scouts of Cumberland Valley in Dickson County, \$500.00; 7.) Pioneer Springs Interpretive Signs, Millington, \$200.00. The secretary also gave a short report about materials filed with the TTA secretary, including minutes from 1969-2002 and various archive materials. These materials are available upon request. Additionally, the secretary noted that the TTA annual report has been filed with the Tennessee Secretary of State and that proper acknowledgement of this filing has been received.

APPROVAL OF NEW CHAPTER—As was done at the previous Board meeting, members present decided to move one agenda item forward for early consideration: the request for approval to form a new chapter entitled the Cumberland Gap Chapter. Anne Wesley brought forward the formal request sign by Barbara Smith and Rosemary Register. In the petition for affiliation, Smith and Register noted the following: "As officers of the Club, we certify that the Club meets the membership requirements for a TTA chapter, and on behalf of the club's membership, we petition the TTA Board of Directors for recognition of the Cumberland Gap Chapter." A motion was made and seconded for approval to form this new chapter; the motion passed, and the Cumberland Gap Chapter will become TTA's 13th chapter. Anne Wesley will work with the new chapter to determine the specifics of membership expiration dates, etc. (The Cumberland Gap Chapter was formerly the Cumberland Gap Hiking and Biking Club.) Anne also

reported that there is also a possibility of a 14th TTA chapter. TTA now has close to a thousand members, including the 40 memberships from Highland Rim. The new Membership Directory will be available in June.

TTA BY-LAWS—Copies of the Tennessee Trails Association By-laws were distributed to all Board members. (Another copy of these by-laws has been added to the secretary's notebook and the TTA Archives.)

TREASURER'S REPORT—Carol Haley gave the financial report and distributed copies of the TTA Balance Sheet (as of December 31, 2001), a printout from the Check Register, an Income Summary, and the Expense Distribution Sheet. She noted that TTA is doing well, that memberships are increasing,, and that the checking account is doing well. She read thank-you notes for the Evan Means Awards from those associated with Historic Rugby and from the Girl Scouts of Cumberland Valley who have made a butterfly garden at the trail head of a walking trail. Carol also noted that auditors are working on the TTA accounts; the Nashville and Northwest chapters will be getting forms to sign. The treasurer's report was approved as given. A motion was made to send \$100.00 to the Highland Rim Chapter. This motion passed.

CHAPTER REPORTS—TTA chapter reports were given as follows:

- 1. Highland Rim (Doug Ratliff)—Reported that the chapter is holding monthly meetings and having approximately two hikes per month. They have gone to the Savage Gulf area. They have reviewed the 10 essentials of hiking, and Brent Morris has discussed how to lead a hike. Arleen Scheller (from CTC and the Plateau Chapter) is scheduled to speak about state natural areas. "Hikes are going and projects growing," said Doug. "We've had at least 25 people at each of our meetings."
- 2. Memphis (Gloria Lenski)—Reported about an upcoming trip to the Smoky Mountains on June 8-15. The Memphis Chapter is also sending out follow-up letters on matching donations for CTC. Jerry and Gloria attended the Foot Trails Conference; there is another meeting in August in the Chattanooga area. The meeting and specific sessions were very good.
- 3. Murfreesboro (Mark Stanfill)—Reported that their group has had some hikes and that they are "keeping steady." Their June schedule is filled with hikes. Mentioned that they are proud of "Miss Bertha."
- 4. Nashville (Libby Francis)—Reported that there have been numerous hikes and activities. The annual picnic was a success. There are hikes every weekend and about 60 people at the meetings. "We're making progress."
- 5. Northwest (Jim Clark)—Reported that the group met regularly during the spring semester and sponsored several events and hikes, including a compass hike at Shiloh, a wildflower hike at Ferne Clyffe in Southern Illinois, and a presentation by ranger from land Between the Lakes.
- 6. Plateau (Charles Jones)—Reported that "life is good on the Plateau." The group has a beginner's hike once a month, and they have had four good hikes and are making plans for National Trails Day.

ASSOCIATE ORGANIZATION REPORTS

1. CTC (Sandra Spearman)—Gave a detailed report on the Great Breakaway Project and the work done on the three new gorges where the slopes were cleaned. She shared a scrapbook with pictures, including Red Ash Bridge Installation at Core Creek, Old Highway 63, Caryville, TN; Breakaway 2002 at the Devil's Racetrack; and cleaning up the Soddy area where 25 dump trucks were filled with garbage. She mentioned the work done by Jim Schroder and the award he will get for his work (May 30). She encouraged people to hike part of Jim's trail and see his work. (At this point, there was a discussion of writing up Jim's work for the American Hiking Society's Volunteer of the Year Award. It was noted by several that Jim has done "phenomenal work.") The CTC campaign continues, and materials were distributed with specific financial figures. National Trails Day plans are underway; Hike for Health activities are scheduled for June 1 at Cumberland State Park. There will also be an "Ultra Marathon: A Time to Run" fundraiser on Oct 5. Noted that there is great interest around the gorges in trail building and

trail work. There is also the possibility of new TTA chapters forming in these areas. The new fall programs will underscore the major push for trail building; work on the gorges will be pushed. The Fall 2002 Program Schedule was distributed; upcoming events in September include the Back County Outing (Sept. 6-7), the Trail Trraining Workshop (September 13-15), and the American Hiking Society Volunteer Vacation (September 22-28). In October, there is a Front Country Outing (Oct. 5-6), Fall Breakaway I (Oct. 10-13), Fall Breakaway II (Oct. 17-20), and a Back Country Outing (Oct. 25-27). In November, there is a Front Country Outing (Nov. 1-3) and a Volunteer Cabin Weekend (Nov. 15-17).

TRAC (Jim Deming)—Reported that there was a meeting in early May with 10 members present. Roger Mack was elected vice president, and Issac Blue was elected treasurer. There was discussion of the relationship of TRAC and TTA and a TRAC/TTA Committee was named as follows: Jim Deming, chair; Jim Poteet, Anne Wesley, and Leigh Jones. The focus will be to get friends of trails groups together and TRAC will meet with TTA at the TTA annual meeting. The next TRAC meeting is Thursday, May 30, at 7 p.m. and will feature a presentation about rail trails. Deming noted that one can hike or bike 27 miles in the Cherokee National Forest with no crossings. He said that there are terrific projects all around that he hopes all can support but that with these projects we have to be patient. He also reported that the state budget crisis is very serious and that if we do not pass an income tax, state parts could shut down. He did a presentation in Nashville about TRAC.

REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

West Tennessee (Jerry Lenski)—Reported that he is working with Larry Jerrett in the Holly Springs National Forest area. Related discussion ensued about KTA and a hike out of Cumberland Gap, the newsletter, and the hike schedule.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

SLIDE SHOW—Fount Bertram reported: "It's finished—sort of!" Some slides still need to be duplicated and organized.

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY—Noted that the theme for American Hiking Society's National Trails Day 2002 is "Hike for Health." TTA and CTC are offering hikes on various segments of the Cumberland Trail State park with, as is listed in the promotional brochure, "something for everyone, ranging from easy to moderately difficult." The date is June 1, 2002.

FINANCIAL-No new report.

EDITORIAL—Nothing really to report--except the reminder to "write to the general reader" when preparing materials for the newsletter and to give as much information as possible.

NEWSLETTER (Diane Manas)—Noted that the chapters who have established an Outings Coordinator are able to get information to the newsletter so much easier. She suggested that each chapter delegate an Outings Coordinator. (Members of the Board commented about the good work that is done with the newsletter and how this publication keeps us all informed. Leigh Jones said that the newsletter is the lifeline of the organization." and thanked Diane for all her work.) There was also general discussion about starting another publication, a shorter version of the newsletter that would be aimed at a different audience. Diane distributed guidelines (blue sheet) for submitting hike schedules and hike reports to the TTA Newsletter and a sheet (yellow) with TTA advertising rates.

OLD BUSINESS

SOUTHEAST REGIONAL FOOT TRAILS CONFERENCE— There was discussion about the Southeast Regional Foot Trails Conference and the possibility of trail networking and conservation; there is the possibility of 5,000 miles of connected trails. Do we want to form a coalition? Do we want to help host? Fount will clarify dates for the annual meeting and expressed the hope that TTA would "heavily participate." The group agreed.

ANNUAL MEETING—The TTA Annual Meeting will be Nov. 8 -10, 2002, at Fall Creek Falls State Park. Those planning this event are sure "it's going to be great!" Libby noted that auction materials (letters and forms) are forthcoming in the chapter chairs packets.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS—Leigh Jones distributed a sheet listing membership on five committees: Evan Means Grant (Carol Haley, Libby Francis, Arleen Scheller, Leigh Jones, Jim Poteet, Brent Morris, Jerry Lenski, Fount Bertram); National Trails Day (Arleen Scheller, chair, and Fount Bertram, Libby Francis, Carol Haley, Brent Morris, and Leigh Jones); Financial (Carol Haley, chair, and Libby Francis, Gloria Lenski, Leigh Jones, Jim Poteet, Fount Bertram, and Arleen Scheller); Editorial (Diane Manas, chair, and Jim Poteet, Jim Deming, and Dan Brennan); and Membership Classifications (Anne Wesley, chair, and Gloria Lenski, Dan Brennan, and Eric Wilson)

WRITTEN REPORTS—There was discussion concerning the chapter reports at the Board meetings. If a chapter representative cannot attend, it would be good to send a short written report to be read at the Board meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The Nominating Committee was named as follows: Jim Poteet, chair, Jerry Lenski, and Diane Manas. They should have a report for August.

2003 FOOT TRAILS CONFERENCE—There was discussion of the commitment TTA might make in attending and helping host this conference.

LNT Catalog—Diane distributed copes of the Leave No Trace catalog.

NEXT BOARD MEETING—The next Board meeting will be Aug. 18, 2002, at Murfreesboro.

The meeting was adjourned.

SECRETARY'S NOTE: In reviewing the TTA Bylaws distributed at the May Board meeting, the secretary noticed that Item 6.08 referred to the responsibilities of the secretary as follows: "The secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings of the Board and of the membership, and shall distribute copies of these minutes to the Board within two weeks following any meeting." The secretary notes that the remaining minutes (from the 3rd and 4th Quarter Board meetings) will be e-mailed or mailed by regular post to Board members within the specified time frame and that additional copies of minutes will be available before all Board meetings.

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History of the Tennessee Trails Association

Shortly after the National Trails Act was signed on Oct. 2, 1968, Mack S. Prichard, State Parks Naturalist; Robert D. Brown, treasurer of the Tennessee Scenic Rivers Association, and E. W. Means, outdoor editor of the Oak Ridger, discussed the idea of getting people together to establish a State Trails System in Tennessee

A preliminary meeting was held at Cumberland Mountain State Park Nev. 16, 1968, with 13 interested persons attending. This group agreed that there should be a Tennessee Trails System and a second meeting was set for Dec. 7, at which time Tennessee Trails Association was formed.

It was agreed that the Cumberland Trail, which had been proposed in 1965 by the Clinch and Powell River Valley Association, would be the pilot project to establish the feasibility of a State Trails System. Committees were formed to start where CPRVA left off.

Bob Brown was the first president of TTA. During 1969 the Cumberland Trail began to take shape, with Brown, Donald Todd, Sr. of Wartburg, and John McIntyre of Oak Ridge leading the work on various sections. Other members were considering routes for the statewide system.

TTA was a loosely-knit organization the first year, but a constitution and by-laws were adopted at the second annual meeting at Cove Lake State Park D.c. 6, 1969. Donald Todd, Sr. succeeded Bob Brown as president and Bob became vice-president and program chairman. The newsletter, "TENNESSEE TRAILS", began publication.

TTA has been supported from the beginning by the State Dept. of Conservation. Department representatives at the second annual meeting proposed that a State Trails Seminar be held to discuss possible legislation for implementation of a State Trails System.

At the first State Trails Seminar, at Montgomery Bell State Park April 11, 1970, it was decided to work on a trails system act for introduction in the 1971 session of the General Assembly Participants at the Seminar were not entirely satisfied with a bill which had been introduced by Rep. Robert J. Bible of Kingsport in 1970.

The revised State Trails System Act was sponsored by Rep. Bible and several other members of the House. Sem. Douglas Henry, Jr. of Davidson Co. was the primary sponsor in the Senate. It provides for seven State Scenic Trails, which are listed in the TTA brochure. It also provides for State Recreation Trails, several of which have been established, and for connecting trails.

TFA is the seordinating organization for volunteer groups, serving as liaison between the Dopt. of Conservation, industrial landowners, and those who are mapping and building the Trails System. Our membership consists of individuals and organizations which become supporting members. Ten or more members in any community may form a local chapter. The first local chapter was formed at Oak Ridge in 1973.

Tennessee Trails Association members met at Cove Lake State Park December 6, 1969, 10:00 A.M. EST, for the purpose of adopting a constitution and by-laws, as drawn up on November 15,1969, and to elect officers for the ensuing year, with Bob Brown acting as president.

The constitution and by-laws were read by E.W. Means with a discussiby following as to the purpose of the Association, resulting in a minor change to the constitution. A motion was made and seconded that the constitution and by-laws be adopted as amended. The mation was carried.

The report of the nominating committee was read by Bob Brown. This committee consisting of John McIntyre, Ed Casey, Donald Todd and E. W. Means submitted the following slate of candidates:



A motion was made and seconded that these officers be elected by acclamation. The motion was carried.

9.00	Local Chapters.
9.01	Five or more voting members in any local area may form a local chapter of the Tennessee Trails Association upon approval of the Board of Directors.
9.02	Any TTA member may affiliate with a local chapter without paying any additional dues or fees.
9.03	Local chapters will receive operating expenses from the parent organization based upon the number of members affiliated with each chapter.
9.04	Each local chapter may elect a chair and other officers as deemed suitable and necessary, and shall schedule meetings and outings according to the wishes of its members.
9.05	Each local chapter will designate one of its members to serve as its representative on the TTA Board of Directors.
3.06	Spending of local chapter funds will be controlled by the local chapter officers.
9.07	However, each local chapter will provide the TTA treasurer such financial information as is needed for the filing of any state and federal tax returns.
10.00	Associate Organizations.
10.01	Associate Organizations can be formed within TTA to pursue and promote a focused issue as it relates to the TTA Charter.
10.02	Five or more voting members of TTA may form an Associate Organization upon approval of the Board of Directors.
10.03	A colleague organization may become an Associate Organization upon a majority approval of their general membership and upon approval of the TTA Board.
10.04	Each Associate Organization will develop and maintain a mission statement describing its objectives and strategy for dealing with its charter issue, and will regularly report to the TTA Board of Directors on its activities.
10.05	An Associate Organization may be a membership organization and its members shall be considered regular TTA members and receive the full benefit of such membership.
10.06	An Associate Organization will reimburse TTA for the costs of providing TTA membership services to its members.
10.07	The membership of each Associate Organization is responsible for electing its own leadership.
10.08	An Associate Organization may choose to establish an advisory board structure whose members may or may not be TTA members.
10.09	The TTA president will be an ex officio member of any such advisory board.

10.10	Each Associate Organization will designate one of its members to serve as its representative on the TTA Board of Directors.
0.11	An Associate Organization is free to seek its own financial support, is responsible for the management of said funds, and is to submit regular financial reports to the TTA Board of Directors.
10.12	Each Associate Organization will follow guidelines established by the Board as to the form of communication of its affiliation with TTA in print and other media.
10.13	On dissolution of an Associate Organization, the responsibility for its issues, and all funds of the Associate Organization, revert to TTA, except that an externally formed Associate Organization can separate from TTA with an equitable distribution of funds.
11.00	Amendments.
11.01	These Bylaws may be amended by a simple majority of the members present at any Annual Meeting or at any special meeting called for the purpose of considering amendments.
11.02	Any proposed amendment shall be distributed to the membership at least 30 days in advance of the meeting at which said amendment is to be considered.
