Grimes Slaughter writes: "The February TTA hike is along a section of the Cumberland Trail which was cleared under the leadership of John McIntyre. We will start at Caryville and hike in a general southeasterly direction, climbing the Cumberland Escarpment along the way. There will be sweeping views of a giant dog-leg bend in the Cumberland Escarpment, the Tennessee Valley, and the Smokies if the weather is clear. Some of the trail is cleared in only a rudimentary fashion, so parts of the hike can be considered almost off-trail.

"Wear waterproof footwear for stream and ditch jumping, and bring a lunch. The distance measures only 3.6 miles, but the ups and downs make it seem more like 5 or 6 miles. We will meet at the Caryville Junior High School, fronting on I-75 and Tenn. Route 63, at 10 a.m. EST, Feb. 15. We'll shuttle as many cars as possible to the other end of the hike. Farking is limited so some ride pooling will be done at this point."

She writes: "Former secretary--recently resigned from a part-time job when it became full time.
