We meet at the Park Office, just inside the main entrance off U.S. Highway 70 at 9:00 a.m. Wentral Daylight Time. This will be TTA's first hike on a new trail which will be added to the State Recreation Trail System. It has both historic and scenic features. There is a family campground on a nice creek, for those who would like to stay overnight.

Gordon Newland writes of the July 10 hike: "We will meet at Park Head-quarters, Roan Mountain State Park, at 10:00 a.m. Eastern Daylight Time. There are camping facilities at the park for those who would like to stay overnight, either Friday or Saturday." We'll give more details in the July

Grimes Slaughter, TTA President, reports: "Rain-washed forests, sundrenched skies, and turbulent streams formed the setting for the May hike in Fall Creek Falls State Park. The same rains which evidently kept TTA members away in droves made Cane Creek and unfordable, unswimmable torrent with standing waves at the crossing point, so the hiking party returned other the same route they had follwoed up to there. Overnight camp site No. 1, with its enclosed facilities and 116-foot deep well and pump (well separated) were commented on, and the well waters partaken on, to give the party a six-menths supply of "arn" in solution. Those participating were Bob Richards, leader, Russell Fryer of Nashville, Merrill Nelson of Chattanooga, and Ruth Slusher and Grimes Slaughter of Oak Ridge."

A Bi-centennial ceremony held at Jamestown, Virginia, May 14 inaugurated the 4,400-mile T ans-America Bicycle Trail. Originating in trail heads at Yorktown, Va., and Astoria, Oregon, the cross-country trail intersects or parallels many historic and-recreational trails including the Lewis and Clark, Santa Fe, and Appalachian Trails. It enters some 25 National Forests, two National Parks, two National S enic Waterways, and four National Parkways, crossing ten states.
