Those going on the Nashville Chapter hike Feb. 12 will meet at 8:30 a.m. CST at the Cumberland Museum. A pickup will be made at River Road and Charlotte Ave. about 8:45. This will be a leisurely to 5-mile hike over moderately rough terrain atop a spectacular spiny ridge in Cheatham County. Indian Town Bluff overlooks the historic Harpeth Shoals of the Cumberland River, now wovered by the waters of Cheatham Reservoir. Indians used the shoals as a crossing place long before the white man came. The shoals blocked Union boats from reaching Nashville during the Civil War. Bring your lunch. John Hart in trip leader.

The Feb. 19 hike will begin at the parking area for Tristates Peak, where U. S. Highway 25E crosses Cumberland Gap, at 9:30 a.m. EST. Take I-75 north from Knoxville and State Route 63 from Cove Lake to Harrogate and turn left on 25E. There is a half-mile walk up a paved trail to the terminal of the Cumberland Trail at Tristates Peak. It is about 5 miles to Baptist Gap. The trail follows a hogback ridge with some interesting views, Carry lunch and a canteen. Grimes Slaughter will be the leader, as Evan Means will be attend-

ing the annual meeting of the Tennessee Outdoor Writers Association.

Evelyn Tretter reports that 6 people went on the hike in Cedars of Lebanon State Park Jan. 15. Icy roads discouraged East Tennessee members. It was the first day with above freezing temperatures of the New Year, with sunny weather and a high of 35 degrees. Some snow remained under the cedars and in the sinkholes for which the park is noted. Those on the hike were Russell and Kim Fryer, Oscar and Eris Krosnes, Don Nelson and Evelyn Tretter. The group also visited the Park Nature Center.
