Those going on the raft trip will meet at Trotter's Food Market on U. S. Highway 411 at the junction with State Route 30, about 1.5 miles south of the Hiwassee River bridge at 9:30 a.m. EDT. The trip will begin with a shuttle upriver to Appalachia Power House, where the raft ride begins. The float lasts about 5 hours and ends at the Highway 411 bridge. Bring lunch in a waterproof container that will float. If you don't have a deep tan, wear

clothing that will protect you from sunburn.

There will be a walking tour of the restored community of Rugby established by Author Thomas Hughes in 1880 for disinherited sons of English nobility. The admission price is \$2.00 for adults, \$1.00 for students, preschool children free.

Dave writes: After the tour and lunch (bring a picnic or there is a cafe nearby.), we will hike to the "Meeting of the Waters", the confluence of Whiteoak Creek and Clear Fork. A trail will lead us up to Clear Fork, past scenic bluffs, boiling whitewater, rhododendron, giant hemlocks, and lush ferns, to the "Gentlemen's Swinning Hole". Bring your swimsuit.
