The Nashville Chapter will sponsor a hike on Sept. 15 on the old Natchez Trace near the place where Meriwether Lewis met his death mysteriously. It is a Class II trail, a 5-mile loop through a very scenic and historic area. Bring lunch and meet at the museum in Meriwether Lewis State Park at 10 a.m. CDT. From Nashville, take I-65 south to State Route 99, Columbia exit. Go through Columbia to Gordonsburg, then proceed south on the Natchez Trace Parkway 6 miles to the exit for the park. The TTA membership activity for September is a hike on the Shellsford-Cardwell Mountain Trail, off the Thail of Tears State Scenic Route, on the 29th. Meet Stan Gorin at Cumberland Caverns at 9:30 a.m. CDT. In case of rain, take along a hard hat and flashlight for an alternate cave trip. To get to Cumberland Caverns, take U.S. 70S between Sparta and McMinnville and watch for the sign, or go southeast from McMinnville on SR8.

The big news at this time is the Fourth State Trails Symposium, to be held at Standing Stone State Rustic Park Oct. 25-27. Copies of the program and a reservation form have been mailed to TTA members and interested persons. Pres. Gaines says he would like for as many as possible to return the reservation blank so he can get an idea how many will be attending. It is not necessary to send payment with the blank.

Pres. Gaines writes: "I would like to encourage everyone to come to our annual meeting and the Trail Symposium at Standing Stone. The meeting should be interesting, productive - and fun. We will have an opportunity to learn a let about trail facilities and programs across the State, as well as to prepare policy statements on a variety of topics.

"I hope that we will have a large turnout for both the Friday and Saturday programs. An open discussion period with government officials Friday afternoon will allow us to express our views and discuss our trails and environmental programs. "Bob Clement, the newly-appointed director of TVA, has written to TTA expressing his desire to work closely with us on trail programs. He has extended an invitation to meet with him in Knoxville to discuss mutual interests. The Nashville District of the Corps of Engineers is finalizing recommendations for an extensive system of foot trails in the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area, including 65 spectacular miles of the John Muir State Seenie Trail.

"Commissioner Ann Tuck, Assistant Commissioner Tim McCall, and State Parks Director Don Charpio have all discussed with me their priorities for trail development and maintenance within State areas. The active role of _ ' TTA in supporting these agencies and officials will result in increased trail opportunities."

David Stidham reports that 33 people showed up for the Walls of Jericho hike July 21 on a rainy weekend. Thirty-one started on the hike and about half of them gave up by noon. The creek was high, so that the route had to

be changed somewhat. It was quite an adventure.

Evelyn Tretter reports that 12 adults and three children participated in the Nashville Chapter's hike Sunday afternoon, Aug. 5, to Round Bottom and the Narrows of the Harpeth, an archaeological and natural area recently purchased by the State. A temporary headquarters building for the complex is open and rangers are on duty at the Narrows. Round Bottom was an Indian town dating back to about 1100 A.D. and contains about 15 mounds, some of which have been excavated by the Division of Archaeology. The group walked to the Bottom, then returned to the cars and went to the Narrows, where there is a scenic ridgetop trail, historic tunnel which routed water to the site of an old iron foundry, and a marvelous swimming hole. This was greatly enjoyed by some of the group, in the mid-nineties heat. John Hart and Harry Williamson were the leaders.

The Weekend on the Hiwassee Aug. 17-18 was a rousing success. Thirty-two people went on the raft trip and 12 hiked the Oswald Dome Trail with Harry Williamson.
