The big news this month is the Fourth State Trails Symposium and TTA annual meeting at Standing Stone State Park October 25, 26 and 27. President Joe Gaines, Harry Williamson and the Committee are assembling a very impressive program, which includes door prizes and a fish fry. The general symposium committee includes Sharen Patterson, David Stidham and Evelyn Tretter. Workshop chairpersons are Bob Brown, Russell Fryer, Bertha Chrietzberg, David-Rhyne and Pres. Gaines.

Registration for the Symposium will begin at 2:00 p.m. Central time on Thursday, Oct. 25, followed by a social "mixorë at Six p.m. The first session of the Symposium will begin at 8:30 a.m. Friday with addresses of welcome by State Trails System Administrator Harry Williamson and TTA President Joe Gaines. Reports on their respective trail programs will be given by John Fisher of the regional staff of Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service (HCRS), Atlanta; David Pack, coordinator of Recreation Services, TVA, Norris; David Stidham, recreation planner, Nashville District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers; and Marvin K. Lauritsen, Supervisor of Cherokee National Forest.

Merrill D. Beal. superintendent of Great Smoky Mountains National Park, will continue with the reports after lunch, followed by Conservation Commissioner Ann Tuck. There will be coffee breaks at 10:15 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

At 8:00 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 27, Williamson will give his annual report to TTA on the state of the State Trails System. Starting at 9:00 there will be workshops on Trail Classification, Trail Ethics, Trail Health and Safety, the Hike Leader's Guide, and Trail Maintenance. After lunch the workshop reports will start at 1 p.m.

The TTA President's Report and the annual business meeting will start at

2 o'clock. After the business meeting, participants have a choice of activities, including day and overnight hikes in Standing Stone State Rustic Park; hikes on Corps of Engineers trail around Dale Hollow Lake; boating, fishing and sightseeing. In the evening there will be informal socializing, pickin' and grinnin' (bring your strings), trail talkin' and fibbin', etc.

We have two amendments to the By-laws to be considered at the annual meeting:

1. Section 5 of the By-laws to be changed to read, "Students in high school or at the undergraduate level in college may pay three dollars (\$3.00) per year, with no voting privileges." This would increase the dues to cover increased costs of printing and postage.

2. Add the following: "The President of the Tennessee Trails Association can nominate one person or organization each year to receive an official TTA award. The nomination will be presented to the Board of Directors and a two-thirds vote of the Board is required for approval. The award is to be presented for outstanding contributions to the Tennessee Trails Association, Inc., or to the furtherance of trail or natural resource programs in Tennessee. However, at the time of the adoption of this amandement, the President may make three nominations for immediate presentation of awards."

The Nashville Chapter will not have a meeting in October, unless they want to hold it after the mixer at Standing Stone Thursday, Oct. 26. That is the regular Nashville meeting date. Chairman David Stidham urges all members to attend the symposium, or at least the annual meeting on the 27th.
