The second quarter Board meeting will be held at Cumberland Mountain State Park Friday, May 9, at 7:30 p.m. The agenda will include plans for the annual meeting; a financial report; discussion of a possible new format for the Newsletter, and a proposed dues increase for 1981. Board meetings are open to the membership.

Bob Richards will lead the hike on the Big Creek Day Loop in the Great Stone Door Natural Area Saturday, May 10. Hikers should meet Bob at 9 a.m. Central Daylight Time at the roadside park on the south side of State Highway 56 in Beersheba Springs. This is 26 miles south of McMinnville, on the left as you top the mountain from the Collins River Valley, or 28 miles from Monteagle via Tracy City.

The hike will be 8 to 9 miles and will go down through the Great Stone Door into the Big Creek Gulf, returning after the halfway mark along the rim of the Big Creek gorge. The trail is described on page 126 of TENNESSEE TRAILS. Hikers should bring sturdy hiking boots, water and lunch.

Gene Curp invites all TTA members to join the Nashville Chapter on the trip to Mammoth Cave National Park May 24 for an easy (Class I & II) 7.1-mile day hike. Gene says, "See a blind valley, numerous old homesites, ridges, bluffs, and an old country church and graveyard. Eleven deer were sighted while scouting the trail. Bring a trail lunch and water.

"Camp overnight with us at our reserved site, Great Onyx Meadows. A picnic shelter with two fireplaces, tables and chemical toilets are the facilities offered. Plan on hauling water from Park Headquarters. Children, tyros, and tenderfeet of all ages are welcome. Should you have any concern over the distance, relax. Three escape points are located along the loop.

"Carpeolers from Nashville meet at 7:30 a.m. at Cumberland Museum. Rendezvous at the gas station and postoffice at Park Headquarters at 9:30. Campers will be given time to lock up their gear before the hike. Departure from the gas station for the trailhead, Good Spring Church, will be promptly at 10:15 a.m. A leisurely pace should get us back to our cars about 3:30 p.m."
