TWO TRIPS THIS MONTH TO: VIRGIN FALLS POCKET WILDERNESS (White County) Sunday, August 22, 1982 Saturday, August 28, 1982

On Sunday, August 22, the Cumberland Mountain Chapter will sponsor a hike to Virgin Falls Pocket Wilderness in White County. Virgin Falls is formed by an underground stream that emerges from a cave, drops over a 110 foot cliff and goes back into a cave at the bottom. The area has numerous overlooks, caves, and streams. It is partially bordered by the Caney Fork River. This area is one of several Pocket Wilderness Areas maintained by Bowaters Corporation. This is a strefuous hike which will take between 6 and 8 hours. Be sure to wear sturdy hiking shoes, pack a good lunch and bring plenty of water. We will be carpooling from Hammond Motor Parts and leave promptly at 8:00 a.m. C.D.T. on Sunday, August 22, 1982. If you would like to meet us at the trail head follow these directions: Take Highway 70 to Derossett, TN (located between Sparta and Crossville), follow the signs from Derossett to the parking area. 

TTA PROGRAM FOR AUG. 26 - Warner Park Nature Center, 7 p.m. central time. The monthly meeting of the Nashville Chapter will consist of a slide program on the Cherokee National Forest Rare II designations and future recommendations. This presentation was put together by the Cherokee National Forest Wilderness Coalition and deals with many of the issues concerning wilderness designations within Tennessee's National Forest. TRIP REPORT - Five of us hiked the 3½ mile wooded path at Old Stone Fort, July 17. The superintendent, Bill Thompson, and naturalist Tom Langlin, told us the history of the 900 acres. The so-called walls, now earth mounds, are what is thought to be Indian ceremonial grounds, but long ago the first settlers called it a stone fort. This is how it got its name. The beginning of Manchester was right here when two Englishmen built a paper mill using the water power from the Duck River. They named the town after their home town in England. The stone walls still stand. We chewed the leaves of the Sourwood tree to find out why the Thai community in Manchester has been stripping the branches for the leaves. Very tasty. Marylin Turner and Mildred Lassiter were hesitant when Tom Langlin asked if they wanted to see a copperhead. Naturally, after that Helen McGregor and Vic Canada were on the lookout for others. We saw no more, but enjoyed the yellow blossoms of the Foxglove and Hearts-a-bustin'. After a picnic lunch and wade in the water we headed home ... Gayle Douglas.
