The special guests at the meeting were Buddie Gomatser, Preston Lee, Jim Dale, and Paul Ensminger of the Tennessee Division of Forestry. Forestry is to lead a tour in to the Flint Fork region of Pickett State Forest for the Spring Wildflower Pilgrimage. Flint Fork is an unique area in Pickett State Forest known for its relatively pristine nature. While not a virgin forest, Flint Fork is uniqué because of the arrangement of the species that grow there, and over a hundred acres of forest land has been set aside to remain in its natural state. HIKES

Cumberland Mtn. State Park. April 6-7. Join the flatlanders from Memphis in the Cumberland Plateau uplands for hiking and camping fun Easter week-end. Anyone venturing east on Friday can obtain lodging at what has become known affectionately as the Barnett's Deluxe Hostel between Lebanon and Gallatin. Be prepared with a sleeping bag. Directions to the Barnett's abode may be obtained by contacting the trip leader.

For Saturday's initial hike the group will meet at the parking lot closest to the Lake Trail at 9:30 a.m. C.S.T. The 7.7 mile loop trail travels around the park lake and Byrd Creek. The group will probably find this trail interesting, invigorating and easy, so they will probably be ready for more hiking. So the hikers will choose another trail for afternoon hiking based on the disposition of the group.

To get to Cumberland Mountain State Park take I-40 east to Crossville and then take

US 127 for 5 miles to the park.

Sunday the group will hike twice. Bob will lead a shortened hike of two miles around the lake at Cumberland Mtn. State Park for early risers at 7:00 a.m.

After breakfast and loading up the group will travel down I-40 to the Carthage exit. After exiting take TN 53 to Carthage and then TN 85N to Cordell Hull Lake. The group will meet at 10:00 a.m. at the Tater Knob Overlook parking area before hiking the scenic Bearwaller Gap Trail. This six mile trail passes through various forest types and alternates between the lake shore and the hills and bluffs above Cordell Hull Lake. This trail will be a fitting way to say farewell to Middle Tennessee before rolling down the road to Memphis.

4th Annual Weekend of Fun at Pickett April 13 & 14, 1985

Once again, everyone is invited to Pickett : State Rustic Park on the weekend of April 13 & 14 for a full "weekend of Fun" that has now become an annual event for the Cumberland Mountain Chapter. The activities will begin on Saturday evening at 7:00 p.m. CST with a chili supper followed by slide presentations. An one that has slides they would like to show are welcome to bring them. The following morning we plan to hike into Flint Fork Cove, which is an area of wilderness located in Pickett State Forest. Flint Fork is a local example of a mixed mesophytic forest which contains a wide variety of timber species and representative plant communities. As there are no established hiking trails in Flint Fork, there will be a designation of class III placed on the hike although it will be no more than three miles in length. We will leave from the Pickett State Park Office at 10:00 a.m. CST. Camping and cabins will be available at Pickett, however, it is advised that you make reservations.

HUNTER STATE PARK

Join us for guided wildflower tours at Long Hunter State Park. This Park lies along the shoreline of Percy Priest Lake and touches three counties, Davidson, Rutherford and Wilson. We will visit a woodland area in the morning for early spring flowers and have lunch in a picnic area beside the lake at noon. We will hike a short nature trail near Couchville Lake after lunch to observe the unusual "cedar glade" flowers some of which are found only in the above three counties in Tennessee. We will also hike a portion of the Volunteer Trail to see the wild hyacinth in bloom. Bring lunch and beverage and join us for an easy hike and family-type outing.

Meet at 9:00 AM CST at the Couchville Lake Parking Area of Long Hunter State Park. From Nashville, take Murfreesboro Road east to Highway 171 (Hobson Pike). Turn north (left) on Highweay 171 for approximately five miles, crossing the lake. The entrance to the Park is on your right. Drive all the way in to Couchville Lake. From Murfreesboro, take

Highway 41 (Murfreesboro Road) northeast toward Nashville, turning right on Hobson Pike (Highway 171).

On Sunday, April 21, there will be another hike in this area in connection with the Cedars of Lebanon Wildflower Pilgrimage held this same weekend by that Park. For further information:

TRIP REPORTS

Trip Report-Dec. 2, 1984 Memphis Chapter - Tennessee Trails Association

The Memphis chapter took a trip to visit an interesting site in its "own backyard" on a very pleasant day. T. O. Fuller State Park consists mostly of a golf course at present, with a nice picnic area and one rather overgrown trail for the handicapped. It also is the location for Chucalissa Indian Village and Museum, and as such houses a fine collection of Indian artifacts and an extensive group of displays depicting and explaining the life and history of the first settlers of our region.

We hiked the handicap trail swiftly, then blazed our own trail through a wooded area where a trail is projected to be constructed soon. The great advantage of this kind of hike for our group is that there is no way to determine if one is lost or on the trail. We did wander off in several directions, but managed to find our way back to the museum area in time to eat lunch and see the very informative film about the Indian settlement. Our awareness of the history of our section of the mid-south was increased greatly, as well as our sense of well-being after a day outdoors in the pleasant company of fellow hikers.

Northrup Falls Loop Trail, March 3 (Cumberland Mountain Chapter) - Eighteen people turned out for the hike around the Northrup Falls Loop Trail at Colditz Cove State Natural Area. The day was balmy and sunny; a far cry from the blizzard conditions that existed only a couple of weeks before, which made for a perfect way to get out and walk off those late winter blues. The high cliffs, huge hemlocks, thick growths of rhododendron, along with the fact that early

wildflowers were beginning to peep through to soil made for a short, but enjoyable Sunday afternoon hike ... Steven Burke.

Paul and I experienced a cold and very windy night camping atop Mt. Nebo but the sunrise seen from behind the park's pavillio overlooking the valley and Lake Dardanelle made any minor discomfort only a faint memor The only disheartening thing about our visit was the amount of trash we saw in the park and the lack of knowledge of the park's staff. The park does possess a real sense o history because it was built by the CCC in the 1930's and since the area served as a resort area prior to the establishment of th state park.

The group hit the road with Pinnacle Mountain State Park just outside Little Rock, ou destination for Sunday is hiking pleasure. Getting to the park allowed for a scenic drive especially the last portion where we traveled near the shoreline of Lake Maumelle

The entire group hiked the pleasant Rocky Valley Trail and discovered mayapples in

bloom, a St. Patrick's day shamrock and some other flowers beginning to bloom. The short East Quarry Trail, a spur trail off of the Rocky Valley Trail, provided a scenic vista above the Arkansas River Valley. After that the energetic women set off to the Kingfisher Trail that is highlighted by hugh cypress trees along the Little Maumelle River and other hiking possibilities. The wornout men hit the road in a futile attempt to find a television featuring Tigers (the Memphis State basketball variety).
