

NEWS FROM OUR SUPPORTERS
As soon as the message came over the radio that the temperature on Saturday, Jan/llth would reach 50°, the yen began to build in the bones of any hiker worth his salt.

Nine members of the Big South Fork Hiking Club gave way to the lure of the great outdoors and gathered on that beautiful crisp morning at the Yahoo Falls trail head for a winter respite. The woods were still dormant and clumps of frozen leaves crunched underfoot. Rhododendren leaflets were beginning to unfurl from a cool night's rest. The first overlook provided a wide panaramic view of the gorge. Evergreens were enjoying their prominence in the midst of leafless trees of every variety. Lack of rain had left the creek nearly dry. Its edges were rimmed with swirling white ice.

In a short time, we were descending the three long metal flights of stairs leading to the canyon bottom. Awaiting us there on the floor of the falls was an ice sculptor incredible to see. A small amount of water continued its 113 foot drop but the weeks of sub-freezing temperatures had resulted in a build-up of scalloped ice some 20 feet at the base and about 25 feet high. It looked like a decapitated pyramid. At the top of the falls, huge jagged icicles clung precariously to the rim. We took our time drinking in this spectable of nature (cont'd page 3)

HIKES

Rehruary 9 - Marrowhone Lake

The Mashville Chapter will sponsor a hike on Sunday afternoon, February 9, at Marrowbone Lake, off the Clarksville Fighway. Meet at Jim Dandy Market and Texaco station at I-24 North and Old Hickory Roulevard. Going north from Mashville on I-24, get off at Old Fickory Roulevard exit, turn right (east). Market is first building on your right.

Northrup Falls Icicle Hike (Colditz Cove State Natural Area - Fentress County) February 9, 1986

On February 9 the Cumberland Mountain Chapter will visit Colditz Cove State Natural Area. The short but scenic hike around the 1.5 mile loop trail will take us through a mature hemlock forest with thick growths of mountain laurel and rhododendron. Among the sights will be high cliffs and the majestic Northrup Falls; a water fall that plunges over sixty-five feet into

the cove. We will meet at the trail head at 1:00 p.m. CST. The trail is not difficult, however, it is wet in certain places. If the weather cooperates, there should be ice formations hanging from the surrounding cliffs. To get to Colditz Cove, take highway 5%E out of Allardt and turn right on the Crooked Creek Hunting Lodge road. You will find Colditz Cove parking area approximately one mile down this road.

CROWLEY'S RIDGE STATE PARK, Arkansas-Memphis Chapter. February 22nd.

This park is not as large as Village Creek on the opposite end of the ridge, but it is a pleasant place to walk. It was built in the 1930's by the CCC. If Crowley's Ridge State Park does not offer enough hiking to satisfy the group then there is another hiking trail at Lake Frierson State Park right next door.

Crowley's Ridge State Park is slightly less than two hours from Memphis. The park is 15 miles north of Jonesboro on Highway 141 at Walcott.

Those wishing to car pool should meet at the Kingsway Christian Church at 7:**9**0 A.M. The trip will be discussed in more detail at February's chapter meeting on the 20th.

WAPANOCCA WILDLIFE HIKE & BIRDWATCH -ARK. Memphis Chapter - Jan. 5th - It was hard to get going on a cold winter morning, but those who made the trip found their efforts rewarded. Our knowledgeable leader, Martha Waldron from the Audubon Society, helped identify the ducks we saw on the lake plus birds found in the marsh and woods nearby. We saw many Canadian Geese; Mallards, Canvasbacks, Scaup, Widgeon, Pintails, Coots, Gad-walls, were among the ducks spotted. As if this weren't wnough, two immature bald eagles and a red-tailed hawk joined the group. Some of the songbirds seen and sometimes heard, were white-throated sparrow, fox sparrow, marsh sparrow, meadowlark, jay, cardnals, horned larks, finch and downy, hairy, and yellow-bellied woodpeckers were there also. Part of the group had to leave early, but those remaining walked all the way back to the dam, enjoyed lunch and the walk back.
