The 1987 TTA Annual Meeting

TTA's Annual Meeting will be somewhat different from those held in the past. We will actually be camping out! As mentioned in last month's newsletter, the Annual Meeting will be held at Bandy Creek Campground in the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area. Bandy Creek is located on Highway 297, 22 miles from Jamestown and 14 miles from Oneida.

Bandy Creek features both tent and R.V. campsites with water and electrical hookups. We have reserved Group Area E (tent sites only) for all TTA folks who attend the meeting. This area has showers and a large picnic shelter with a fireplace and grills. An ice machine is also available (\$1.00 per bag).

Those of you who do not wish to camp out can reserve cabins/chalets at nearby Pickett State Park or a room at the South Fork Motor Lodge. Also, be sure to read the piece in this newsletter from Charit Creek Hostel for another alternative.

In the tradition of years past, the Friday evening meal will be "potluck", so bring your best recipe prepared for everyone to share. Keep in mind that your kitchen facilities will be grill or campfire this year. Supper will be served at 7:00 p.m. to allow travelers more time to arrive. The Board of Directors will also meet Friday night.

Those of you who pre-register will have breakfast provided by Hardees on Saturday and Sunday. It will consist of sausage biscuits, a cinnamon roll, and juice. Coffee will be available for everyone.

Saturday's dinner will be a special treat this year. We will be dining at a nice restaurant only ten miles from the campground (3-1/2 miles from Pickett State Park). Barcara's is a unique spot to eat. The food is excellent and a live band will be playing. The building was once the old Sharp School.

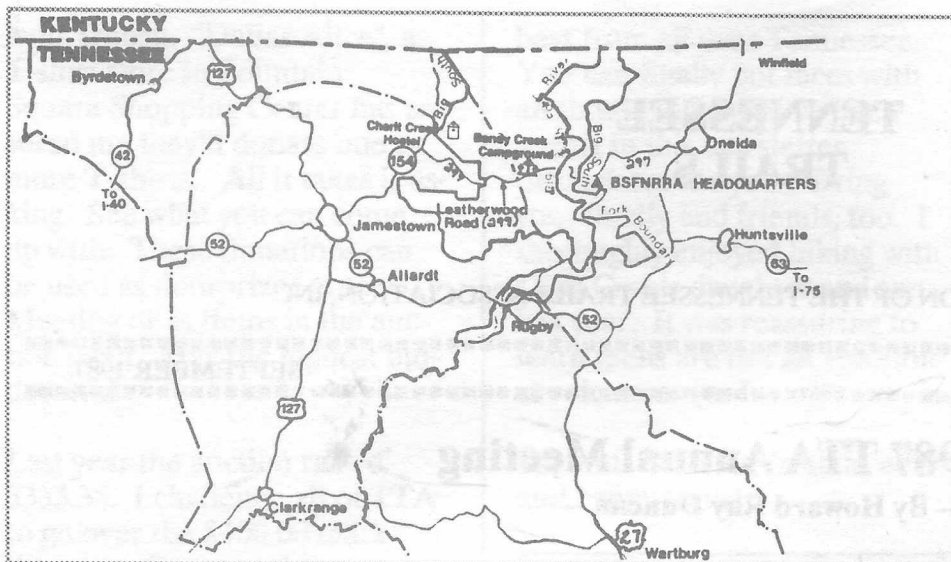
Campers who pre-register will have your choice of steak or shrimp, steak fries or baked potato, salad, bread, drink, and

dessert. Those of you who do not pre-register can order from the menu (at regular prices).

There will be numerous hikes for all levels of hikers (easy to not so easy) on Saturday and Sunday. This area is rich in trails which all view beautiful scenery. There are outfitters nearby who offer rafting, canoe rentals, and mountain bike rentals. Horses may be brought if desired, and stabled at Bandy Creek or Charit Creek Hostel. Also in the vicinity are Historic Rugby, Pickett State Park, etc.

Saturday night will also be the time for the always hysterical auction with David Stidham, in all his glory, as auctioneer. No one can hold an auction in quite the manner David can. Be sure to bring your odds and ends to be auctioned, door prizes (optional), and your MOOLAH! Proceeds go towards TTA projects and the Cumberland Trail's maintenance and expansion.

For you folks coming from the west, easiest access is via I-40E. Take the Jamestown exit at



Monterey and Hwy. 62 east to Hwy. 127 at Clarkrange. Follow 127 north into Jamestown. Just two miles north of Jamestown, follow the signs on 154 north to Hwy. 297.

Those of you traveling from the Knoxville/Chattanooga areas might find traveling I-75 easier. From I-75, take the Oneida-Huntsville exit on Hwy. 63. Follow 63 west through Huntsville to Hwy. 27. Hwy. 27-North will take you to Oneida and Hwy. 287. Follow Hwy. 297 to the campground.

Those of us in the Cumberland Mountain Chapter of Tennessee Trails are looking forward to hosting this year's Annual Meeting. Altogether, this could be the best Annual Meeting ever. Everyone is encouraged to attend and have lots of fun!

HIKE CANCELLATION

Please note that the Fall Creek Falls trip scheduled for September 19 has been canceled. Instead, the following hike has been planned.

SMOKIES DAY HIKE Saturday, September 19

Any hiker looking for a challenging and beautiful hike will want to join us for a day in the Smokies climbing Mt. Cammerer. This is a moderately difficult trail that includes 5-1/2 miles of gradual ascent and a backtrack of the same 5-1/2 miles (of course, it always looks different going the other way!).

The altitude gain is 2953 feet -- from 1975 feet above sea level at the Davenport Gap starting

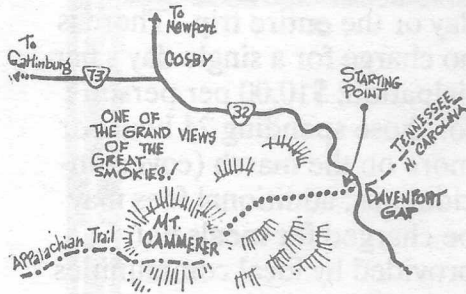
point to 4928 feet at Mt. Cammerer Tower. Though the grade is never extremely steep, this is a fairly difficult hike because you are nearly always ascending. There are few level stretches from Davenport to Cammerer.

The view from Mt. Cammerer, though, is one of the two or three best views in the park. From the top, you'll see hundreds of square miles of fields and forests. To the north and east lie the farm lands of Cocke County, Tennessee with the Pigeon River curving lazily through them. To the west runs the main range of the Great Smokies. Stretching away to the south are the forested mountains of the North Carolina side of the park.

We will meet at 8:00 a.m. at the Cracker Barrel on Hwy. 32 and I-40 or at 9:00 a.m. at the amphitheater at the Cosby Campground. This is in the immediate vicinity of the trailhead.

Sign-up is requested for this hike. Minimum age is twelve. Call Rhonda Snyder in Jefferson City at 475-8428 or Ninez Giles in Nashville at 297-2281. Several hikers plan to spend Saturday night at a group campsite in the Cosby campground. Plan to join the group by calling the Park Service at Sugarlands to reserve a space close to the TTA group site. A map is given on the next page.

LATE JULY TRAILWORK ON SECTION 2

Although last minute car trouble kept two willing and able Nashville Sierra Clubbers from joining us, Joe England and I swingbladed, lopped, and removed deadfalls most of the

way from the firetower to Campsite 4 on Saturday, July 18. Next day, Bobby Harbin and I painted blazes from Walden Ridge Road to the firetower and also did some treadwork on the side trail to the spring.

Joe and I spent Monday and Tuesday with his summer youth crew clearing new growth from Coal Creek Gap northwest a couple of miles. Wednesday, I lopped and swingbladed for almost a mile from Caryville to the ridgetop southeast of Tunnel Hollow and did the same Thursday for about a half mile on Walden's Ridge near Vesper.

Friday and the next Monday, Joe and Robbie Harbin and I worked the same area southeast through part of a badly overgrown, burned over stretch. Tuesday we cleared about a mile from Campsite 4 south toward Poplar Gap where our March 14 TTA group had worked. Wednesday we removed a corral from around a Cove Lake State Park stable that is to become the Cumberland Trail tool shed and storage building. -- Bob Brown

LOW-COST ACCOMMODATIONS FOR THE TTA ANNUAL MEETING

For those of you who are non-campers, a low cost alternative lodging for the upcoming Annual Meeting is available at the Charit Creek Hostel in the Big South Fork.

Charit Creek Hostel is located off Hwy. 154 about one mile from the Pickett State Park entrance. Guests must hike in to the hostel from a parking lot 1 mile away. We offer bunk beds with mattress, pillow and blanket for \$5.64 per night. As a special service for the Annual Meeting, free shopping service will be provided for TTA members on that weekend (October 9-11, 1987). This usually costs 10% of your total bill.

The hostel is a rustic, remote facility with many buildings dating from the 1800s. There is a fully furnished propane kitchen with stoves, refrigerators and hot water. A bathroom with cold water sinks and composting toilets is available.

When making reservations, please give us at least two-three weeks notice so that we can process your shopping list. Be sure to tell us that you are TTA members coming to the Annual Meeting to get

THIRD ANNUAL HOHENWALD VOLKSMARCH

September 26, 1987
(Sanctioned by AVA/IVV)

The Lewis County Volkssport Club, a division of Lewis County Senior Citizens, Inc. is sponsoring this volksmarch in Hohenwald, TN. The starting time is 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. with the finish by 5:00 p.m.

DISTANCE/TERRAIN: 6.2 miles, gravel and chert roads through rolling hills and flat land. Not suitable for strollers or handicapped persons.

ELIGIBILITY: All welcome. Leashed pets permitted. Children under 12 must be with an adult.

START FEES: \$1.50 for IVV credit only. \$4.00 medal & IVV credit if pre-registered (\$5.00 if not). Those desiring neither must carry FREE start card. Pre-registration forms must be postmarked by 9/15/87.

PROCEDURE: At the start of the volksmarch, each person will receive a start card. The card will be carried on the walk and personally presented at the check points for stamping. At the finish table, turn in the card to receive your medal and/or IVV credit.

REFRESHMENTS: Ice water at all check points. At the finish ten, German & Southern U.S. food and drinks at reasonable prices.

OVERMOUNTAIN VICTORY TRAIL September 23 -- October 7

Take a walk into history on the Overmountain Victory Trail followed by colonial militia in 1780 on the way from eastern Tennessee and western Virginia and North Carolina to King's Mountain, South Carolina. This annual family-oriented re-enactment commemorates the gathering of backwoods volunteers who rushed to halt the advance of a British army fresh from the capture of Charleston and the defeat of the Continental Army in the South. In a stunning turnaround, frontiersmen marched 200 miles across the mountains and spectacularly defeated the British.

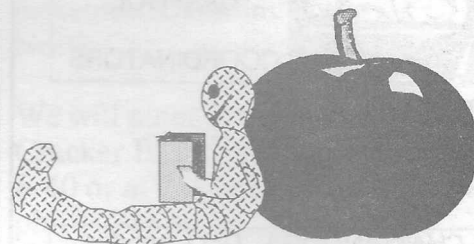
This year's march begins September 23 in Abingdon, Virginia and concludes at King's Mountain National Military Park on October 7. Closely following the original route, walkers follow the same timetable through scenic mountainous countryside in delightful early fall weather. Period dress is encouraged but is not mandatory.

Local ceremonies and historical demonstrations provide an insight into colonial life at the time of the Revolution. Participants walk from 5-20 miles per day and camp along the way. Most days are along roads and no backpacking is required. In general, the trail is of moderate difficulty and suitable

for active people from ten to 80. Everyone is welcome for a day or the entire trip. There is no charge for a single day's participation; \$10.00 per person for those spending 24 hours or more on the march (covers incidentals; additional fees may be charged for meals not provided by local communities and groups).

TRIP REPORT:
Spring River Canoe Trip
July 19

Mammoth Spring is just a stone's throw from the state line in northern Arkansas. Each hour, the spring pumps some nine million gallons of very cold water into the aptly named Spring River. The river then winds southeast down the slopes of the Ozark plateau, dropping over numerous short ledges along the way. These

water falls add zest to what is generally a leisurely canoe trip.

The banks of the river are a checkerboard of wooded hills, limestone bluffs, cow pastures, tent camps and summer cabins. Trees that have fallen in the water are decorated with strings of sunning turtles. Occasionally, a brown banded water snake will swim across the stream. Beneath the surface are plenty of trout. One of the obstacles to navigation is fishermen standing waist deep in the middle of the river.

It is easy to see why this is one of the most popular float streams in the state. And the hotter the weather, the more inviting the cool water becomes. On summer weekends, the mob of paddlers make the river look more like a city street at rush hour than a rustic waterway.

There were several regular members on the trip besides myself. Freddi Felt came with her son Ross. Ray Burkett brought his son Kevin, and Kevin brought his buddy Tolbert Cates. There were also two new members: Barbara Edwards and Bobby Craft. Barbara was promptly baptized into the club at several water falls. Bobby was probably disappointed at not being so initiated, but he will just have to wait until we get caught out on the trail in a rain shower. -- John Parish

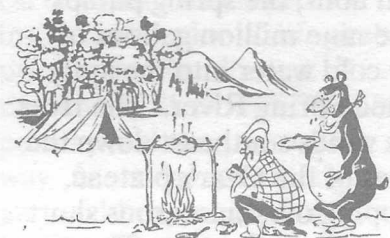

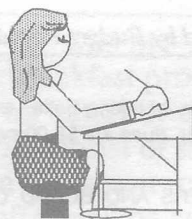
